

QMU is an attractive campus university located to the east of Edinburgh. The beach, countryside and shops are all nearby, and it's just six minutes train ride from all the amenities of Edinburgh's stunning city centre.

Location

Located fewer than six minutes by train from Edinburgh city centre, the position of our campus affords spectacular views across Edinburgh, including Arthur's Seat, an extinct volcano in the middle of Scotland's capital city, and East Lothian's attractive coastline.

The campus is easy to reach by car and public transport, particularly by train, from Edinburgh city centre. It also offers easy access to the coastal town of Musselburgh and beyond into East Lothian. The N1 Cycle Route runs alongside the campus, making QMU also easily accessible by bike. The A1 is located next to the campus, which ensures quick access to the east, west and south of Edinburgh and beyond. Less than half an hour's drive away is Edinburgh International Airport which offers flights across the UK, Europe and many international destinations.

Campus living

A campus university offers everything you need in the one place, and at QMU everything is close to hand.

Our main academic building houses the core teaching areas including lecture theatres, classrooms, seminar rooms, labs and clinics for our health courses. It also includes our Learning Resource Centre — the hub of our campus — which, aside from library facilities, offers numerous study spaces and a plethora of IT facilities to support your studies.

Catering facilities are also located within the main academic building. Our food court offers a wide variety of eating options. There is also a shop on campus offering basic groceries and snacks, and a Starbucks outlet.

Across University Square, a central outdoor space with tables and benches for you to enjoy during the summer months, are the sports centre, drama and performance spaces, the Students' Union (SU) bar/cafe area (Maggie's) and the SU office area. For more information on the SU, see pages 46-47.

Sports facilities at QMU include a gym, an impressive sports hall, as well as an astro turf pitch, weights room and a dance studio — for more information, check out pages 48-49.

For students on our drama and performance courses, there is a dedicated theatre space, which is used for learning and teaching, as well as for public performances on campus. Drama students also have access to rehearsal and workshop spaces within this area of the campus.

Student accommodation

Less than a one-minute walk from the academic building is our Student Village, which has 800 study bedrooms each forming part of a self-contained flat. These flats accommodate three, four, five or six people sharing. Each shared flat is well equipped with all the facilities that you need for 'home life'. Importantly, 24/7 security on campus means you can feel safe, and relax and enjoy your time as a student.

If you choose to live on campus, you will quickly become part of a welcoming and friendly community. Living on campus is a great way to meet people and make lifelong

friendships. Our ResLife programme offers a range of fun social, educational and cultural opportunities for you to get involved in. It's a great way for you to relax, create a social life and settle into your new university community. For more information on our accommodation and ResLife, visit pages 44-45.



How we teach and how you'll learn

Our teaching is focused on building your knowledge and confidence, developing your problem-solving skills and preparing you for a successful career.

Academic year and timetables

QMU's academic year is divided into two semesters. Semester One runs from September to December with assessments taking place before the Christmas break. Semester Two runs from January to May, also culminating in assessments. The majority of our undergraduate degree courses are modular with most students undertaking six modules each academic year (three in each semester).

The Academic Calendar will be available to view at www.qmu.ac.uk/about-the-university/quality/committees-regulations-policies-and-procedures/academic-calendar/. During term time, teaching is usually between 09:15 and 18:15 Monday to Thursday and 09:15 and 17:15 on Friday, with undergraduate teaching normally ending by 13:15 on Wednesdays to allow participation in sports and societies activities. Timetables are available from mid-July (but subject to change), with continuing students able to see their personal timetables around this time. While efforts are made to make the timetables as student friendly as possible, teaching can take place at any time during the teaching week, and may not be consistent on a week-to-week basis.

Course length

Many courses at QMU offer the opportunity to study over three (Ordinary level) or four (Honours level) years. The four-year degree system in Scotland is different from that offered in the rest of the UK (although qualifications are recognised and accepted both across the UK and internationally). The four-year honours degree is designed to allow students to study their chosen subject in greater depth and breadth. A number of our healthcare courses offer only a four year honours degree option.

From 2020 entry onwards we will also offer a four-year integrated undergraduate master's degree in our health profession specialisms. Students will commence their chosen course with a view to graduating with a master's degree in four years. Year's Three and Four will be taught alongside postgraduate students studying on the relevant Pre-Registration* postgraduate course. Students have the opportunity to exit with a BSc (Hons) at the end of Year Four and will still be eligible to apply for registration with the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC).

*Pre-Registration postgraduate courses are for students who already have an undergraduate degree in a relevant area who want to gain a health professional qualification.

Part-time study

Our undergraduate courses are designed to be studied full-time, although it may be possible to study some on a part-time basis. Please contact Admissions (admissions@qmu.ac.uk) for advice on part-time study options.

Modules

All of our courses follow a modular pattern. Core modules, and examples of optional modules, if relevant, are listed on each course page in this prospectus. While modules listed are correct at the time of print (February 2020), they may differ slightly from those offered in 2021 and later years. Where optional modules are listed, please be aware that not all options may run in an academic year. Placements are considered as modules.

Location

Teaching mainly takes place in our academic building on campus. However, if you are following a course that includes a practical placement (see individual courses), this will normally take place off campus. More information regarding placements can be found on the individual course pages. Some courses also offer a study abroad option — please see the individual course pages and page 22 for further information on this.

Teaching and learning activities and assessment methods

As a student at QMU you will benefit from a range of teaching methods ensuring you have the opportunity to make the most of your chosen course.

Teaching methods include lectures (some of which may feature interactive approaches including live voting systems), and seminars and tutorial groups allowing for more in-depth discussion of the topics being studied. A number of our courses also include practical placements. These allow you to

put the knowledge and experience gained in the classroom into practice in a real-life environment and better prepare you for your future career. In addition to your classes, you will also be required to undertake self-supported learning, making use of online resources and those in the Learning Resource Centre to complete independent research or work on group projects.

Assessment will take place in a variety of ways, including written, oral and practical examinations, depending on your course of study. Most courses will also include forms of continuous assessment such as essays, group work and presentations. Class sizes

Class sizes at QMU vary according to your course. However, the relatively small size of the University means that you can quickly get to know our staff and fellow students on your course, while also experiencing a range of teaching and learning opportunities aimed at enhancing your overall student experience. You need never feel lost in a crowd of students in a huge lecture theatre.

Staff expertise providing real-life learning

We take pride in ensuring that our teaching is relevant to today's workplaces and prepares students for their chosen careers. You will be taught by academic staff with in-depth knowledge and experience of their subject area. Our staff ensure that they are up to date with the latest knowledge, thinking and developments in their field and have strong links with industry and professional bodies. Some continue to practise professionally in their own areas of expertise, while others are involved in world-leading research, shaping future discussion and methodologies in their profession. You may also be taught by visiting lecturers from across the globe, attracted to the University and its location in Scotland's capital. Doctoral students with a relevant and current research focus make an important contribution to teaching on some of our undergraduate degrees. QMU provides initial training and ongoing development opportunities for doctoral students acting in this role.

External review

All Scottish universities, including QMU, are subject to regular periodic external review. This is undertaken by the Quality Assurance Agency. The review process is called Enhancement-led Institutional Review (ELIR). ELIR focuses on the University's arrangements for managing academic standards and enhancing the quality of the student learning experience. QMU's most recent ELIR visit was in 2018. The outcome was a judgement of effectiveness. This is the highest of three possible outcomes. Our teaching aims

Teaching and learning facilities on campus

Teaching spaces

- Traditional lecture theatres and smaller seminar-style classrooms
- Specialist teaching facilities for students on some of our health courses, including: clinical skills laboratories; biochemistry laboratories; and a fully functioning podiatry clinic used by the public
- Film and video editing suites, including a one of only two 'infinity' green screen facilities in Edinburgh
- A drama studio and spaces
- A nursing simulation suite
- A range of technology facilities including a TV studio, photographic and graphic studios, and a video conference suite

Learning Resource Centre

- Open 24 hours a day and forms the heart of our campus
- Contains resources and facilities which are an essential support to your learning and teaching at QMU
- A combined facility for directed and independent study, based on integrated library and information service provision
- More than 1,000 study spaces are available with a variety of social, quiet and silent study areas and bookable group study rooms
- Access to a range of books and journals, both print and electronic, other electronic resources and audio visual material to support your studies
- Help and support for users is provided
- Liaison librarians make sure you are trained in accessing the wide range of electronic resources available to support your learning

Assistive Technology Room

- Designed to meet the needs of students with disabilities
- Contains a range of assistive software, ergonomic and accessible peripherals, and adaptive furniture

Computing facilities

- Study spaces offer access to the QMU networked IT and research facilities via cutting-edge thin-client technology
- Each terminal provides access to up-to-date software including the Microsoft Office applications suite, subject-specific specialist applications, and internet and email access via our own high-speed network
- Access to high-quality printing, copying and scanning, and a variety of academic and research software
- All rooms in our student accommodation offer high-speed wireless internet access
- Our 'Remote Desktop' service enables you to access the majority of applications and electronic resources off campus wherever an internet connection is available

Effective Learning Service

- Supports you in developing and enhancing your learning strategies and skills for university study
- Offers informal workshops as well as one-to-one appointments offering individual guidance and advice on a range of topics including essay writing, referencing and exam preparation skills. Provides specialist English language support for international students
- Offers easily accessible study resources

Personal development plans (PDPs)

- You will receive guidance in producing a PDP which encourages students to carry out key learning processes, including reflecting on what you are learning, planning and recording your personal objectives, and communicating these to others
- Plans help you develop the key skills you require for learning and employment, and prepare for your future career
- The process is used to support student learning in different ways, according to the course of study

Preparing you for employment: placements, careers and employability

With the jobs market becoming ever more competitive, we want to ensure that our graduates are fully equipped with the knowledge and skills to compete successfully in the jobs market.

Our employment rate

97.1%* of those graduating from a full-time undergraduate degree course at QMU go on to employment or further training within six months of graduating, which demonstrates that our graduates have the skills and knowledge that employers value. QMU's graduate employment rate is well above the Scottish university sector average of 95.3%. Indeed, we are third in Scotland for employment of our graduate leavers.

Courses designed for a satisfying career

QMU provides a range of professionally relevant courses, at both undergraduate and postgraduate level, and produces graduates who are well prepared to enter a career after graduation.

Our courses aim to enable you to have a positive impact on people's everyday lives and the type of careers that our graduates enter are ones which will bring job satisfaction and the opportunity to contribute to society.

We are one of the leading providers of courses allied to medicine, and the professional accreditation, approval and registration provided by these courses allows our graduates to begin working immediately, often in the National Health Service, as, for example, physiotherapists, podiatrists, occupational therapists, radiographers and dieticians. Our other health sciences courses can lead graduates into commercial research work, further academic research and entrepreneurship.

Our range of business courses produce graduates who go on to very successful careers either running their own businesses or working in the marketing, retail, events, hospitality and tourism sectors. Our arts and social sciences graduates also go on to have successful careers in a variety of fields, with many now carving out self-employed careers, for example, establishing their own theatre companies.

There are also great career opportunities for our education graduates.

Examples of the variety of jobs in which our students have found employment are provided on the individual course pages and case studies in this prospectus, and on our website.

Placements

Many of our courses include an integral placement as part of the curriculum. This can range from a few weeks to several months of each year depending on the course, and some courses offer opportunities in the UK and overseas. Our placements are set up to provide students with an environment for practical learning, utilising what you have learnt in the classroom in a real-world setting and offering the opportunity to learn on the job, within the supportive environment of the University.

Not only are placement opportunities an invaluable tool in the learning process, they can also help students towards their future career. By gaining real-world experience, our students are more prepared for the working world and can often find their placements help them with job opportunities. Getting a 'foot on the ladder' while at university can help secure a job in the future, and the network of contacts you build can prove invaluable over time.

Careers and employability

You may have clear ideas about what career you are heading for. On the other hand, you may be uncertain which direction to take or even what your options are.

The Careers and Employability team at QMU assists all students regardless of degree discipline, level of study or stage in career planning. Our team of professionally qualified advisers work closely with each subject area to ensure that support is tailored to your needs.

Our Employability Centre provides a comfortable space to conduct your career research and to chat with members of the careers team on a drop-in basis. You can attend seminars and workshops on topics such as CV writing and preparing for interviews. Our annual recruitment fair puts you directly in touch with employers, and our Employer Mentoring Programme helps you gain an invaluable insight into the graduate world of work.

You can access the Careers and Employability Team online through the University's learning intranet platform, and their Facebook and Twitter accounts. In addition, our online vacancy service provides you with

access to part-time jobs, seasonal work, voluntary work, internships and graduate opportunities.

Further study

Once you have completed your undergraduate studies, you may be interested in undertaking a postgraduate qualification. Dedicated to lifelong learning and continuing professional development, QMU offers a range of postgraduate qualifications to enable you to expand your knowledge and perhaps specialise in a specific area of your chosen field. With an undergraduate degree in a relevant area, you would be able to progress to a course at master's level either immediately upon completion of your undergraduate degree or after a period in employment. Graduates of the University who hold a verified QMU undergraduate or postgraduate award and who are admitted to a postgraduate award at QMU will be eligible for a 10% discount on the published fees. We began our journey after adopting a healthier lifestyle, which included drinking more water. These four pages bring together a selection of our student and graduate entrepreneurs supported by BIZ. These reflect the breadth of talent and ambition at the University and our aim is to give a


flavour of the enterprising spirit that abounds in our staff, students and alumni. We hope it will inspire you.

I'm a voice-over artist and am registered as a sole trader. My voice has been used for audiobooks, adverts, corporate videos, animation films and much more! Clients have included HSBC, Nivea, Royal Mail and many different authors. I have a home recording studio, which allows me to create the final, polished audio tracks.

After a serious accident in 2009, I plucked up the courage to return to university to retrain in a career that I was really passionate about. During my first year, the voice-over world exploded and with new technology emerging it became possible for me to utilise my previous acting skills from home.

The Senior Experimental Officer for the Speech and Hearing Department at QMU was a fountain of knowledge in getting my home recording studio up and running. My Speech and Language Therapy (SLT) training helped me to safely develop character voices and accents.

Due to university contacts, I'm now in the amazing position to also be part of Fitvoice, a community interest company, which allows me to combine my skills as an actress and SLT.



Your personal development: extracurricular learning opportunities and funding

Initiatives, including internships and special funds, enable our students to enhance their learning experience, build their confidence, improve their employability and broaden their horizons. See some examples below.

The Vice-Chancellor's International Travel Fund

The Vice-Chancellor's International Travel Fund was set up with the sole aim of supporting students who wish to take part in study or research abroad. These overseas projects enrich students' academic experience, broaden their outlook on the world and help them to make a real contribution to their field or to serving society's needs.

With funding from the scheme, BSc (Hons) Nursing student, Ross Macdonald, travelled to Uganda with First Aid Africa to provide first aid training to local communities. Ross commented on the experience: "I found my time here to be very beneficial. It made me more confident in my skills in communication and presentation. I also learned about health in a different environment".

BSc (Hons) Physiotherapy student, Lucy O'Brien, received funding to travel to Singapore to complete a four-week

elective physiotherapy placement. Lucy said: "My course required me to complete a self-arranged elective placement in my final year, anywhere I chose. Being able to do an acute placement in Singapore was a great learning opportunity. My communication was greatly challenged as I interacted with a wide range of ages, cultures and nationalities".

Become a Producer

The Become a Producer Fund provides support for students on the BA (Hons) Film and Media course. The grants cover the costs of producing your final year piece of work — this can be costumes, travel, hiring professional actors etc.

Beth Hendy received £440 towards her film. She said: "As a young female creative in Scotland, I am acutely aware of the limited arts funds and the intensely competitive nature of funding. Therefore, I genuinely do appreciate knowing that the University is willing to provide support for someone starting out in this industry. With this film, I am hoping to be accepted for a postgraduate course to further my portfolio and understanding of the industry to enable me in my filming career. With these funds, I will be one step closer to achieving my goals and hopefully be able to fulfil my aspirations once I leave university".

Industry Support

Every year QMU students are fortunate to have the opportunity to apply for financial support from the corporate sector. Funding from the hospitality and tourism industry, from companies such as Apex Hotels, Dakota Hotels and the Kitchin Group, enables students to take

part in activity that enhances their learning and their understanding of the sector. Funding from the Crerar Hotels Trust and the Lord Forte Foundation ensures that restricted finances do not limit students' personal development opportunities.

Megan Gillis was the University's first recipient of the Crerar Hotels Trust Access Bursary. she said: "I'm really grateful to The Crerar Hotels Trust and QMU for their support and for helping me secure my place at university. I now feel able to achieve my full academic and career potential without the financial constraints. My hope is that this course will allow me to not only progress towards my career, but also gain valuable insight into how the hospitality industry works".

By producing shows open to the public, we are contributing to the culture of Edinburgh and showing friends, family, professionals and other creatives what we have achieved, alongside an amazing show experience which can be enjoyed by all. The support it gave helped students such as myself and all those in Amplify Time Productions opportunities to shine and show our skills and talent in their individual rights".

Harry's company is now based within the Business Innovation Zone at QMU, where he benefits from access to small business start-up support and guidance from the campus-based Business Gateway, as well as QMU's rehearsal facilities.

With great links across the world, you can choose to study part of your QMU degree in Europe, Australia, New Zealand, Canada, the USA or Hong Kong. Living in another country, and studying at another institution, will allow you to make new friends from across the world and acquire invaluable life skills. Importantly, it will also help you develop a greater feeling of independence and confidence. Not only does an exchange programme allow you to stretch your wings, it will undoubtedly bring you benefits for years to come.

Where exchanges are available, students can spend a semester at an overseas university. Care has been taken to select appropriate international partnerships, ensuring that a period spent on exchange gives QMU students credit towards their studies.

A number of scholarships up to the value of £5,000 exist to help fund study abroad for students facing financial difficulties.

Helping you succeed: student support services

We provide high-quality facilities in which to study and excellent support services, to ensure you have an all-round positive experience during your student journey.

Pre-entry services

If you are contemplating going to university, we recognise that it's not only information about the course that you need. Everybody's circumstances are different and new students may have to consider issues such as finance, childcare or disability. We are well aware that you will require information on these areas before making your final choice. The Admissions team, Student Funding Adviser and Disability Team are available to ensure you obtain all the information you need before and during the decision-making process to come to university.

You can make contact with any of the services highlighted on this page by phone, email or in person to discuss issues in a confidential and accessible manner, before or during the application process.

Disability

We aim to support all students in our diverse learning community to participate fully in their studies and university life. For students with disabilities such as sensory impairments, medical conditions, mobility issues, mental health difficulties and specific learning difficulties such as dyslexia, we offer a wide range of support. It is helpful to contact a Disability Adviser as soon as you have firmly accepted an unconditional offer of a place on a course at QMU. This helps to provide us with useful information so we can begin to put support arrangements in place for you as soon as possible.

Funding

Our Student Funding Adviser provides information on the funding that will be available to you to support your studies — for example student loans, bursaries, tuition fee loans and childcare funds. For more information on funding and how to contact the Funding Adviser, see pages 160-161.

Mature students and college leavers

If you are returning to education after a long gap you may feel a little anxious about learning and studying again. Our Widening Participation and Outreach team can answer queries that you may have on studying at higher education level. Eligible students will be invited to join QMAAdvance — a short pre-induction course that helps ensure that new students have a smooth transition into QMU, as they embark on their chosen course.

If you are considering joining the University, having studied an HNC or HND programme at college, we will be able to provide guidance and information on opportunities to enter the University directly into Years Two or Three of our degree courses (often referred to as articulation, direct entry or advanced standing). Direct entry students will also benefit from the Direct Entrant Induction programme which includes a range of activities in local colleges and a designated induction event for direct entrants at the start of the academic year. For more information on joining us from college, see pages 34-35.

Mentoring

QMConnect, our mentoring scheme, offers new students the opportunity to be matched with a trained mentor. This service is open to all new students. Mentors are current students in Years Two, Three or Four who have volunteered and have been trained to support other students. We aim to recruit mentors who are studying the same or a similar subject to you, but we cannot guarantee this. Mentors and mentees meet regularly to discuss a variety of issues, both social and academic, which can help make that first year of study at QMU a more enjoyable experience.

Support for care leavers

We recognise that care leavers who have spent time in local authority care, either in residential accommodation, foster care or under supervision orders at home, may require additional advice and support during both the pre-entry period and during the transitional period. We offer all care leavers individual support through our Widening Participation and Outreach team. We can work with care leavers and their social workers to ensure that applicants are supported appropriately through their time at QMU.

QM Cares

QM Cares is our student-led support group for students with caring responsibilities, care experience and those who are estranged from their families.

As part of QM Cares you will have access to:

- advice and guidance to support your application;
- access to our pre-entry and mentoring support programmes;
- the chance to become a paid student ambassador;
- help with accommodation options and
- funding advice guidance.

Post-entry services

If you decide that QMU is the right choice for you, there are further services and facilities available once you commence your studies. The majority of these are located in one central area within our main academic building, providing a one-stop shop for all your needs.

Careers and Employability

Our Careers and Employability Service can provide information, advice and guidance on all matters related to your career. Armed with information on part-time jobs, seasonal work, voluntary work, internships and graduate opportunities, the service assists you in finding employment during your degree and after graduation. Advisers are pleased to help you make decisions about your career and support you in making successful applications. The aim is to see you make a successful transition into the graduate world of work or on to further study. See pages 12-15 for more information on careers.

Disability

Working closely with a network of key academic and non-academic staff, we can offer reasonable adjustments and assessment arrangements, as well as providing guidance for eligible students about Disabled Students’ Allowance (DSA) funding. DSA Needs Assessments can be arranged, as can specific one-to-one support such as note-takers or individual dyslexia tutors where appropriate. For more information about DSA please contact the Disability Advisers (see contact details on page 27).

Funding

Our Student Funding Adviser provides information on funding to support you while you are studying. In addition, advice can be given to students regarding support that may be available if they encounter financial difficulties – for example, childcare funding and discretionary and hardship funds. For more information on funding, see pages 160-165.

Counselling

The Counselling Service offers confidential one-to-one, professional, brief counselling for any emotional or psychological issue affecting your academic work or your general health and wellbeing.

Wellbeing

Our Wellbeing Service offers support for your mental, emotional and physical wellbeing and facilitates building up resilience and healthy living to support you on your journey through university. We can offer advice on help and support for mental health issues. In addition, our Stay-on-Course Programme provides rapid support to students identified as needing help through monitoring academic engagement and referrals from staff and students.

Health

QMU works in partnership with local medical practices to ensure you can access NHS services when you need them. All students are advised to register with a local medical practice after they arrive at QMU.

Worship and reflection

There is a contemplation room on campus which is open to all students for prayer and quiet contemplation and is designed to reflect the multi-faith nature of the staff and students at QMU. We also work closely with St Albert’s Catholic Chaplaincy at the University of Edinburgh, which is located at 23-24 George Square, Edinburgh and is open all day.

Learning Resource Centre and Effective Learning Service

The Learning Resource Centre and Effective Learning Service provide a range of facilities and services to support your learning needs. These include 24-hour access to printed and electronic resources and access to group and individual help on enhancing your study techniques.

Personal Academic Tutor

Each student is assigned a Personal Academic Tutor (PAT) who will help guide you through your studies. Your PAT will normally be your main source of advice and guidance relating to your academic studies and can also refer you to other support services if needed.

School Office

QMU’s School Office provides a bridge between you and your academic subject area. Staff in the School Office will be able to assist with timetabling or general subject area queries, receive and return assignments and make contact with lecturers or tutors on your behalf.

Personal Development Planning

Our Personal Development Planning (PDP) process aims to help all our students develop the key skills they require for learning and employment, and to prepare for their future careers. PDP is used to support student learning in different ways according to the course of study. It is a guided process which encourages students to regularly carry out key learning processes. It can involve reflection on what you are learning, planning and recording your personal objectives, and communicating these to others.

VARIED LEARNING METHODS

GET SOME WORK EXPERIENCE

If your course does not include a placement, our Careers Service can help you find some related work experience. Pursuing internship opportunities will also help you gain invaluable work experience, enabling you to learn more about a profession and what part of the job you really enjoy. OVERSEAS EXCHANGES

Many of our courses offer exchange opportunities (see pages 22-23) where you can spend a semester at a university overseas. In some instances, you may also be able to complete your course placement overseas.

REGISTRATION AND ACCREDITATION

Previous students who have benefited from the funds have travelled overseas to attend conferences, shadowed professionals for a period of time in a relevant organisation or obtained a placement/internship which has given them a significant step up on the career ladder (see pages 12-15).

We recognise that studying in a different country is often a completely new experience for international students and we are keen to ensure that we make your transition to living and studying in a new country as easy, informative and welcoming as possible.

Our International Office staff will be your first point of contact at QMU if you are interested in studying with us here in Scotland's capital city. You can meet the team at numerous events which they attend overseas each year, or chat with them through Skype, phone or email. The team members are

approachable and responsive and want to ensure that you have all the information you need before you move to Scotland.

Orientation programme and social events

Before joining us, you will receive a pre-arrival guide. This is designed to answer any questions you may have prior to departure and also prepares you for your journey to QMU.

To help ease you into student life and help you become familiar with your surroundings, we host an international students' induction programme prior to your course start date. This will include information on settling in and what you can expect during the year ahead, as well as an opportunity to meet some of your fellow students.

We organise a tour of the city of Edinburgh, which is very useful and always great fun.

To help you make friends and enhance your student experience, we organise a programme of social events throughout the year, as well as drop-in sessions. These help to ensure that you have access to all of the information you need to make your time at QMU both enjoyable and successful.

Accommodation

Staying on campus is a great way to meet people and make new friends quickly. It also means that the teaching, learning, support and leisure facilities at QMU are easily accessible to you. Employment while you study

If you require a UK Tier 4 Student Visa to study with us, you will normally be allowed to work for up to 20 hours a week during term time and full-time during holiday periods. We advise you to refer to any restrictions stated in your passport or visa documentation and check that the employment meets your visa criteria.

QMU's Careers and Employability Service is open to all students and provides help and advice about employment opportunities in Edinburgh. This includes assistance in obtaining a UK National Insurance number which you will need in order to work and pay tax in the UK. Post study employment

A new graduate route for international students is planned to be launched in 2021. This will allow eligible students to remain in the UK to live and work for two years following graduation. For the latest guidance see www.gov.uk/browse/visas-immigration

Scholarships

A number of scholarships are available to self-funding international students for undergraduate study. Scholarships are valued at £3,000 and are discounted from your course fees. Information about how to apply for one of these

Medical services

Medical and hospital treatments are currently available under the National Health Service (NHS) to international students in Scotland. Currently, non-European Economic Area (EEA) nationals who apply to come to the UK to study for more than six months may be required to pay an immigration health surcharge. Further information about the immigration health surcharge can be found at www.gov.uk/healthcare-immigration-application. The surcharge status of EEA nationals going forward in the event of the UK leaving the EU has yet to be clarified.

Edinburgh is an established international centre with a reputation for academic excellence that attracts students from all over the world to its institutions. Rich in culture, history and architectural splendour it is an ideal location in which to spend your student years. With a multicultural population, the city has numerous specialist food shops and places of worship for many religions. Edinburgh is well connected by air, road and rail to other major cities within the UK including Aberdeen, Glasgow, London, Manchester and Birmingham. Internationally, Amsterdam, Paris and Frankfurt are just over an hour away by air, with direct flights to the USA, Norway, Qatar, Turkey, UAE and elsewhere also possible from Edinburgh International Airport. More links are being added every few months, reflecting the economic success and cultural diversity of Edinburgh and Scotland.

Applications and qualifications

We recognise and warmly welcome a wide range of international school leaving certificates, matriculation certificates, junior college and polytechnic diplomas as standard entry qualifications to our undergraduate courses. Every effort will be made to equate international qualifications with UK standards of entry, and offers will be made on a like-for-like basis. Applications for entry to all years of our undergraduate courses should be made through the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) by applying online at www.ucas.com. If you would like an initial assessment of your qualifications, please contact our Admissions Office staff who will be able to offer advice.

English language requirements

As well as the academic requirements for your studies, you will also have to demonstrate a proficiency in both spoken and written English. We are able to consider a wide range of qualifications to assess your English language ability, including many school-based qualifications. Where we include an English language requirement as part of your conditions, we will typically refer to the International

English Language Testing System (IELTS). Our minimum IELTS requirements are an overall score of 6 with no individual elements lower than 5.5. This is our minimum entry level and some courses require a higher level of language proficiency. Please refer to the individual course pages for more information.

Pre-Sessional English course

Our intensive four-week Pre-Sessional English course helps to prepare international students for study at QMU. It provides students with the opportunity to settle into life here at QMU and to establish friendships with other students before the beginning of the semester.

This course will be extremely useful for students wishing to develop their academic and language skills before beginning their studies. It will also build their confidence in using English in an academic environment and enable them to understand more about the cultural and study environment at a UK university.

There is a strong practical element with an emphasis on student participation. Students prepare for and deliver a presentation in their subject area, participate in seminar discussions and conduct research for a written

assignment which is submitted in the final week.

Opportunities for practising these skills are integrated throughout the programme. Academic reading and writing skills are also developed and practised.

The main areas covered include:

- planning and writing academic essays;
- reading and writing critically;
- conducting effective research;
- using evidence to support claims;
- giving presentations;
- listening to lectures and taking notes;
- participating effectively in seminars; and
- improving vocabulary and grammar.

Joining us from college

We welcome applications from students studying Highers, Access programmes, Higher National Certificates and Diplomas (HNC/HND) at college. Each year, around 37% of our undergraduate entrants are over the age of 21, and around 18% have gained direct entry onto the second or third year of one of our courses.

At QMU we recognise that not all of our students come to us straight from high school. Many students access our degree courses through alternative routes. Whatever your circumstances, we appreciate that the transition to university is a big step. We are here to help and guide you through the process, providing all the relevant information and ensuring that you are prepared for life as a university student.

We can provide ongoing support prior to applying, during the application process, after you have been made an offer and once you have entered the University. Advice is available on entry requirements (including directing you to the appropriate college courses that are accepted for entry to the University), the application process, student finance and childcare information. You will also be able to visit the campus so you can find out more about studying at QMU. There is also a wealth of information and advice on our website at the link under 'more info' on the opposite page.

College engagement

Staff from the University visit local colleges regularly to give presentations to students. If you would like to find out where and when we will be visiting your college, please contact the Widening Participation and Outreach Team by email (see opposite page). Additionally, local college students on HNC/HND programmes will benefit from opportunities to visit the campus before submitting their applications. They can also get a feel for QMU during a post-offer visit which will provide tailored information relating to the area of interest and an opportunity to meet staff from the subject area.

Access courses and mature students

Students who have completed, or are currently studying towards, an Access qualification (often as part of the Scottish Wider Access Programme (SWAP)) are able to apply for entry to Year One of a wide range of our degree courses. The most common Access courses accepted for entry to our degrees are listed on our website at www.qmu.ac.uk/college-qualifications

College articulation routes

If you are studying or have recently completed an HNC or HND qualification, you may be able to enter directly into Year Two (with an HNC) or Year Three (if you have an HND) of one of our degrees. While advanced entry (articulation) may not be possible in all subject areas, advanced entry into Years Two or Three is often possible where your HNC or HND is in a similar subject area to the degree course you are applying to study. The most common articulation routes are listed on our website at www.qmu.ac.uk/college-qualifications

QMAAdvance

Eligible students studying at college will be offered the opportunity to attend QMAAdvance. QMAAdvance is designed to give you the opportunity to meet other new students who have come to QMU via a similar route and aims to ensure that you feel confident in your abilities while giving early access to a range of key services and staff. The course takes place over three days in the week before the new academic year starts. We send out information about the programme to eligible students over the summer, but if you think you would like more information please contact the Widening Participation and Outreach Team at any stage during the application process.

Direct Entrant Induction

At the beginning of the academic year, students entering directly into Year Two or Year Three of one of our degree courses will attend a dedicated week-long induction programme before starting the course. Direct Entrant Induction is run by a team of former advanced entry students, in partnership with academic and support staff, and will ensure you are fully prepared to join your course at an advanced level. The induction offers subject-specific input and general university information, such as timetable, IT and support service information. Students will also receive guidance on how to develop the academic and research skills needed for degree level study. Our aim is to make the transition from college to university as smooth as possible and give all students the best start to their lives at QMU.

Associate students: an alternative way to get a degree



QMU has worked with a number of local further education colleges to develop an alternative way to get onto a degree course. Find out about our exciting Associate Student scheme here.

Not everyone goes straight from school to university. People take different pathways into education depending on their circumstances. Our Associate Student scheme offers a different route to securing a place on a degree course at QMU.

Associate students are fully enrolled as QMU students from day one, but study for the first year at a partner college on a relevant Higher National (HN) course. On successful completion, associate students will have a guaranteed place at QMU to complete their degree. A number of our degrees are available through the Associate Student scheme and are listed in the table opposite. The entry requirements for all of our Associate Student routes are CCC at Higher, or equivalent.

Benefits

- If you are unsure about making the leap from school to university, then studying at college can be a good way to prepare for the move, and one of the benefits may be the smaller classes at college. As you work through the HN, the college and QMU will prepare you for the more independent learning style and the academic standards required at university level.

- If you have been out of education for a while, or have been working in industry and now want to gain a relevant qualification, college may be a more suitable entry route for you. Colleges specialise in helping people returning to education after a break and learning styles are a lot more vocational and practical than in higher education. The first year of the associate student routes is designed to reflect these types of learning styles.
- You may have found that your Higher results after school are not good enough to get into university. The Associate Student routes offer entry to QMU degrees with slightly lower entry qualifications because the first year is spent at college.
- As you progress through your HN course we will arrange visits to the University campus, workshops on academic skills and guest lectures – this will ensure you are well prepared for the transition to QMU.
- You will be in a class where there are other associate students, so you will be able to make friends with the people you will study with for four years, before joining a bigger cohort of students at QMU to complete the degree.

Facilities and services

During the first year you will be enrolled at both institutions and can take advantage of the facilities at each. College facilities could include catering, library services, student support services, health and fitness facilities, spa and hair and beauty salons and sometimes accommodation. At QMU, you can use the Learning Resource Centre, student support services, the Sports Centre, the Students' Union and its clubs and societies and our excellent accommodation and catering services – details of which can be found in this prospectus.

Funding

You can apply to the Student Awards Agency for Scotland (SAAS) for funding for your course. As long as you meet the eligibility criteria, SAAS will pay the course fees and you can apply for a student loan to help with your living costs. When applying to SAAS you will need to have a conditional offer from QMU, and be sure to apply for the full Degree Fee Waiver (not the HNC Fee Waiver which is less). City of Edinburgh, coast and countryside

Edinburgh and the surrounding area is an ideal location in which to spend your student years.

As a student at QMU you will have easy access to Scotland's beautiful and vibrant capital city, Edinburgh, and also the stunning coast and countryside surrounding the campus.

Edinburgh

Situated in the central belt of Scotland, south of the Firth of Forth Estuary, Edinburgh is easily accessible from all areas of the UK and beyond. It is one of the most beautiful cities in the world and continues to rank high in opinion polls — see page 41. It is a top tourist destination, particularly in the summer months when the city comes alive and plays host to the acclaimed Edinburgh Festivals. The Fringe Festival is particularly enjoyed by students in the city who embrace the month-long spectacle of comedy, music, drama and art. Late December is also a popular time for visitors to 'Auld Reekie' as they come to experience a 'Scottish New Year' at Edinburgh's Hogmanay celebrations — now one of the world's biggest outdoor parties!

With four universities and a large further education college, the city is highly populated by students and is very student friendly. Much of the culture and activity of the city is focused around student life, with students able to share some facilities — such as student unions and libraries — that each institution has to offer. Part-time job opportunities and graduate job opportunities are excellent and many students choose to remain in Edinburgh or the local area during holidays and after graduating.

Edinburgh is atmospheric and vibrant, with all you'd expect from a capital city: packed with shops, cinemas, theatres, restaurants, pubs, clubs, supermarkets, museums, tourist attractions, landmarks, art galleries, concert venues, parks, sports facilities, a zoo etc. The city is also home to Edinburgh Castle. Dating back to the 12th century, the spectacular landmark sits in the city centre on the top of a dormant volcano. The Scottish Parliament is situated in Edinburgh too.

The campus local area

The QMU campus is located to the east of Edinburgh city centre by the coastal town of Musselburgh, in the county of East Lothian. Musselburgh has a population of around 22,000 and offers a theatre, sports centre with swimming pool, supermarkets and shops, a racecourse, golf courses, a harbour and beach, restaurants and bars, a public library and a peaceful riverside. The campus is only a short walk or bus ride from Fort Kinnaird, a large outdoor shopping complex offering high street chain stores, restaurants and a multiplex cinema. There are also several supermarkets in the immediate vicinity.

East Lothian is a beautiful county with over 40 miles of stunning coastline, golden beaches, rolling countryside, historic sites, award-winning attractions, excellent food and drink and the world's finest links golf courses. East Lothian enjoys the sunniest climate in Scotland, great local produce, spectacular natural beauty and year-round recreational opportunities including cycling, walking, golfing and watersports.

A hop, skip and jump to the wider world

Transport links to Edinburgh are excellent — you can easily head north to spend a weekend skiing or hill-walking. You are only 45 minutes from Glasgow, or four hours from London by train. In the city centre, the bus services are extensive, providing frequent links in and around the city. Air links are convenient and widespread — it takes just over an hour to get to Paris, Dublin or Amsterdam. Your accommodation



Many students choose to live on campus in their first year and beyond. It's a great way to make new friends and quickly settle into life at QMU.

Living on campus is very convenient. You are only two minutes' walk from the main academic building, Learning Resource Centre, Students' Union and sports facilities. Our campus offers a safe environment to study and relax in, with hassle-free all-inclusive rents that include electricity and heating bills, basic contents insurance, wi-fi and 24/7 security.

Our Accommodation Services team and ResLife Assistants are on hand to ensure that you quickly feel at home and have the necessary facilities and support to make the most of your life on campus.

Facilities

Our campus houses 800 study bedrooms spread across nine blocks. Within each block there are separate self-contained flats for three, four, five or six students sharing. Each flat has a kitchen and comfortable living area and each bedroom is equipped with an en-suite shower and toilet, wi-fi and well-designed spacious storage. A number of premium rooms are available, providing additional floor space and a double bed. Unfortunately, family/couple accommodation is not available on campus. Students also have access

to a communal TV lounge, bike storage, plenty of green space, an outdoor gym and a BBQ area for when the sun comes out.

Price

In the academic year 2019/20 the all-inclusive cost of a standard room was £113 per week and a premium room was £137 per week. Prices for 2021/22 will be set in early 2021.

How to apply

You can apply for accommodation on our website at www.qmu.ac.uk/campus-life/accommodation/. Applications open in April and we recommend that you apply as early as possible as demand for our on-campus accommodation is generally always high. Please contact us to check availability if you join after the start of term. During the application process students can indicate particular requirements such as being placed in an all-male or all-female flat. We will also try to place postgraduate and mature students together. Further information on the application and allocation process can be found on our website.

Parking and transport

Parking on campus is not normally available for students living in our accommodation. However, transport links to and from the campus are excellent. Musselburgh train station is adjacent to QMU with the journey to

Edinburgh city centre taking less than six minutes. There is also a bus stop on campus with frequent local services, including a night bus.

Safe and secure


Our on-campus residences are designed with safety and security in mind. Each block of accommodation is accessed by swipe card entry with each flat having its own entry phone system. The entire campus is monitored by CCTV and security staff regularly patrol the area 24/7.

Disability needs

QMU is committed to providing a comfortable environment that is easily accessible for students with disabilities. If you have a disability of any kind and are thinking of applying to live in the halls, it is essential that you contact Accommodation Services prior to confirming a place on a course, to determine if the existing accessibility features meet your needs fully. Where possible, QMU will work with you to make adaptations or install equipment that may be necessary.

Living off campus

If you decide to live off campus, our Accommodation Services team can advise you on finding accommodation. Students can apply for a permit to park on campus. However, permits are limited and are allocated according to specified criteria.

You can also take advantage of our exciting ResLife programme which includes a diverse range of social, educational and cultural opportunities for you to get involved in, both on and off campus. The officer team represents all students at QMU and always want to hear from students about what's working and what isn't.

The SU works with the University to run the Class Rep programme. Each class should have at least one Class Rep to represent the students' views, liaise with academic staff etc. The SU provides support and training for Class Reps and also runs the Academic Council which is a forum where Class Reps come together.



Activities

The SU offers a range of sports teams and societies for all students to get involved with. There are competitive and recreational sports teams and clubs, interest-based societies and academic societies. Sports facilities

Whether you are interested in competing in sports at the highest level or simply wishing to keep fit, QMU has its own well-equipped sports centre on campus offering a range of activities.

Our gym is fitted out with the latest fitness equipment including treadmills, cross trainers, exercise bikes, weights and free weights.

The sports centre also includes a large multi-functional games hall which can be used for a variety of sports including: basketball, indoor football, badminton, volleyball, table tennis and netball. We also have an outdoor astro pitch used for 5/7-a-side football. Members can borrow equipment to use in these sports free of charge. Personal training is also available at an additional cost.

There are changing facilities on-site that are equipped with showers and lockers.

Our dance studio plays host to a range of fitness classes including Boxercise, Pilates, Pump FX, Zumba and Spin, many of which are included in your sports centre membership. You can opt to 'pay as you play' or you can purchase an annual membership.

A membership allows students access to the gym, sports hall, the majority of fitness classes, astro turf and free equipment hire. Student membership prices for 2021 will be published on our website.

We recently installed a fully functional outdoor gym, complete with cardiovascular and strength equipment, allowing you to exercise outdoors for free all year round.

Studies show physical activity is good for mental wellbeing and alleviates stress levels — so make the most of both our outdoor and indoor workout areas, especially during exam time.

Budgeting and living costs

Learning to budget successfully helps to make student life a whole lot smoother.

If you are coming straight from school to university, like most other undergraduates, you will probably be managing your own finances for the first time. However, if you are a direct entrant or mature student, there are still costs that you should be aware of when making the move to higher education.

Here you will find some examples of costs which you may need to budget for as a student at QMU. Of course, your finances will depend on individual circumstances, but the tables opposite give you a rough idea of what you need to consider.

If you are a mature student, you will probably already have a grasp of how much your rent/mortgage, utility bills and food etc cost per month. However, you may now need to factor in other costs as you make the move to become a student at QMU.

QMU's Student Funding Adviser can provide one-to-one information, advice and guidance on the funding available to you when you are studying with us, including:

- Loans, bursaries and tuition fees
- Benefits and studying
- Childcare Fund
- Discretionary Fund (formerly the Hardship Fund)
- Nursing Discretionary Fund

- Part-time funding



Drama and Performing Arts

Let's set the scene...the UK has the largest creative sector in Europe. Scotland's creative industries generate more than £5.2 billion and employ in the region of 60,000 people. Cultural and creative experiences stimulate individual curiosity and expand our collective imagination. It is no wonder that the performing arts is such an inspiring field to study and work in and the theatre, film and TV industries are always looking for graduates with creative talent, skills and ideas.

At QMU, you'll learn skills and build relationships that will prepare you for a rewarding career in the flourishing creative sector. Our highly respected Drama and Performing Arts courses will give you the theoretical understanding, hands-on expertise and creative stimulation that will help you to turn your creative ambition into an exciting and sustainable career.

Why QMU?

Go to the theatre, watch TV, listen to the radio or play your favourite computer game and you'll soon see the work of one of our Performing Arts graduates. Doctor Who, Peaky Blinders, The Cry, River City, Outlander, CBeebies, Casualty, Hollyoaks, The Night Manager, Assassins Creed,



Warhammer 40,000, The National Theatre of Scotland, Dundee Rep and The Traverse have all recently featured the work of QMU alumni. And it is not only on stage and screen that our graduates can be found; many will go on to use their creative skills in education, health and wellbeing, tourism and arts management.

We offer courses in Acting and Performance, Drama, Costume Design and Construction, and Theatre and Film. The creative industries are very competitive fields, and trying to enter them can seem a daunting prospect. However, employers are looking for graduates who have developed the specialist knowledge, up-to-the-minute working practices, and high-level communication skills that enhance their natural creative enthusiasm. And that's what you can expect to learn on all of our Performing Arts degrees.

While each course has its own specific emphasis, they all provide students with a comprehensive critical understanding of the processes and practices by which new creative work is generated. Our teaching focuses on the role that the dramatic arts has in the construction of public culture, in the creation of new expressive forms, as the basis for a range of professional practices and in shaping everyday social and psychological life. Through both theory and practice you will explore a broad range of creative and cultural activity. In doing so you'll engage with current debates in these exciting fields of study, while critically engaging with the historical evolution of particular genres, aesthetic traditions, and the way in which plays and screen texts organise understandings, meanings and effects. As part of this engagement, you will have opportunities to work individually and in small groups to produce your own performances, scripts, screenplays, designs, costumes or short films.



Drama and Performing Arts staff at QMU are a mix of arts practitioners and academic researchers. Award-winning staff have produced work for a variety of commercial, cultural, educational and local government clients, and have exhibited and performed their work at festivals in the UK and internationally.

As the home of numerous international theatre, film and television festivals, Edinburgh is the ideal place to study these creative arts. There are five purpose-built theatres showing everything from major West End hits to innovative, risk-taking new writing. For film, it boasts two art-house cinemas, five multiplexes and two smaller cinemas, and the city is frequently used as a location for film and television shoots.

Approach to learning and teaching

All of our Drama and Performing Arts courses combine academic enquiry with opportunities for practical production, and the balance between theory and practice will vary depending on the degree that you undertake. However, alongside traditional lectures and tutorials, all of our courses include creative workshops, opportunities to work on live performances in a variety of roles and invaluable industry-based learning opportunities. There are core modules at the heart of each of the courses complemented by electives and options that let you specialise in areas relevant to your future career path. No matter what options you choose you will be encouraged to examine the creative process closely, find your own style, develop your critical consciousness and think for yourself both creatively and as an entrepreneur.

Our approach to learning fosters collaboration, with students from different courses often working together on productions and creative

projects. For example, the work of Costume Design undergraduates can come in very handy for those on the Acting and Performance course. It's a natural and creative way to prepare for real-life team work after graduation. For performance activity, the University has a fully equipped and licensed studio theatre and five rehearsal studios, two of which have sprung floors to facilitate movement work. We also have a costume design and construction workshop, and a green screen studio. The division also has digital editing suites and post-production facilities where students have access to Adobe creative editing software including Adobe Premiere, After Effects, Photoshop and Audition.

Through our wide range of industry connections, students also have regular opportunities to hear directly from those working across the creative and cultural industries and a number of modules offer students the chance to undertake industry-based learning through going on placement or undertaking real-world client projects. Starting in their first year, students are encouraged to see themselves as future contributors to the creative sector in Scotland, the UK and internationally. At every level, students have the opportunity to develop vital creative enterprise skills including collaborative working, new business development, company formation, budgeting, pitching and presenting, fundraising, design thinking, idea formation and social media management. We design our assessments to put these skills into practice so that our graduates are well prepared for the work needed to develop a sustainable career in the creative and cultural industries.

Many of our students also snap up the opportunity to study for a semester abroad during their course and we have university partners in Australia, Canada and the USA (subject to availability).

Research

Creativity is in your bones forever, and our staff are active as both creators and researchers. Current staff research topics include fascinating work on intercultural theatre training, collaborative devising practices, contemporary Scottish dramaturgy, film adaptation, place-based performance, cultural participation, theatre anthropology, fandom, community festivals and art in healthcare.

Career prospects

At QMU we recognise the phenomenal potential that exists within the creative and cultural industries in Scotland and our courses open up a multitude of career opportunities, ranging from creative practice to arts and festival management, producing, teaching, directing, fundraising and marketing. However, we also know that establishing a sustainable career in this sector requires adaptable and resilient graduates who have a diverse range of knowledge and skills. Creative workers are far more likely to be self-employed or working for SMEs and need to be as skilled in managing a business as they are in developing their creative practice. As such, we also provide support and mentorship for setting up new businesses through the Business Gateway office located on campus and QMU's Business Development Team. Since 2016 students have been able to establish start-up companies within our Business Innovation Zone, and our Performing Arts graduates have been some of the most prolific in launching new business ventures, many of them social enterprises.

Get ready for the performance of your life.

BA/BA (Hons) Acting and Performance*

An actor can be called upon to perform in a variety of venues, media and styles and this course will provide vocational and industry-relevant training that will prepare you to work on stage, screen and beyond.

This new degree will draw on QMU's rich and highly respected teaching expertise within the performing arts. This exciting degree will combine intensive actor training with options that allow you to expand your skills to include areas such as community theatre, playwriting, directing, devising and creative entrepreneurship. The rich and varied curriculum means that the course will not only provide a distinctive and complementary course of actor training in the conservatoire tradition but will also provide you with the knowledge and skills required for the diverse range of ways in which you might wish to develop your career as an actor.

Our teaching staff will use practice-led methods to explore the ways in which the skills you have already developed through further education can be modified and made appropriate to the constraints of different contexts, media and performance spaces. Core modules will support you to deepen your knowledge of the fundamental skills of acting, voice, movement, textual analysis and interpretation, examining the ways in which they are deployed and synthesised to create character and performance.

This course enables you to convert an appropriate existing qualification into a degree and is equivalent to years three and four of an honours degree.

This new two-year course enables those with an appropriate further education qualification to continue their studies through attaining an honours degree that provides the training needed to pursue a contemporary career as an actor.



Structure

You can opt to study for an ordinary degree, completing one year of this course or an honours degree, completing two. You will complete a range of modules each year as outlined.

Teaching, learning and assessment

While a large portion of your course will be delivered through skills-based workshops, you will also have the opportunity to undertake student-led research projects, perform in professional standard productions, prepare a personal portfolio to support your career after graduation and showcase your work to industry professionals. You will be assessed through a range of performances, viva, workshops participation, reflective portfolios and reports.

Careers: Successful completion of the course will give graduates the skills necessary to work as an actor or to apply these skills to a wide range of other roles in the performing arts such as playwriting, community outreach, and theatre in education. Many of our students also go on to establish their own creative business.

Why QMU?

QMU has been delivering courses in acting and the performing arts for over forty years.

You will be part of a large performing arts department, studying alongside students on the Costume Design and Construction, Drama, Film and Media, and Theatre and Film courses.

Many of our staff are active theatre makers and bring that experience to our rehearsal rooms.

You can select from a range of optional modules that complement your training as an actor and will improve your future employability.

BA/BA (Hons) Costume Design and Construction

On this highly respected vocational course you'll learn how to research, design and construct costumes for performers of many kinds. You'll work on live projects with renowned creative companies, and the course has a strong graduate employment record.

Think of a dramatic performance that you loved and you can probably picture the characters' costumes. Costume design and construction are vital when it comes to creating successful theatre, film and TV productions. It's a creative and challenging career: you need to know the theory and history of costume design, how to make costumes physically and how to manage the wardrobe of a live production.

At the heart of the course are the professional practice modules (one in the first year and two in the second and third years of the degree). In these, you will work as part of a team delivering the costumes for a series of live projects working in collaboration with partner organisations and companies.

Supporting this practical learning in Years One and Two are a series of modules which will develop your research and design skills, your analytic and writing skills, and your construction and wardrobe management expertise.

In Year Three you can begin to specialise by working in greater depth on two or more of the varieties of pathways that costume practice offers — perhaps masks, puppets and soft props, or the design of costume for film, or historical cut and construction.

You can extend your knowledge of these chosen skills in your industry placement and in your independent research and construction project. You will also fulfil key production roles in live projects, at QMU and with partner companies and organisers, as a designer, supervisor or specialist maker. Drama

Visit the theatre in Scotland and you will likely see the work of a QMU graduate. Whether you see them performing, hear the words of their script or view their artistry as director, scenographer or producer, they are building a successful and exciting career in drama thanks to their time at QMU.

What is theatre? Why did it develop? What role does it play in society? To have a successful career in the theatre, you need to understand its historical context, techniques and craft. On this course you'll learn the collaborative skills and process involved in creating and staging plays, and will experiment with key contemporary performance practices.

You'll explore all aspects of theatre both front and back stage, including the audience. Who are they? (They may not be like you!) What do they want from a performance? How can you reach your audience? We challenge conventional assumptions of what the performing arts can be and who they are for – from both a practitioner and audience perspective.

You'll engage with a vibrant diversity of practical and theoretical approaches that balance practice, history, research, critical thinking and employability skills. Whether you intend to be a theatre maker, scholar or teacher, the course will guide you in the development of your creative and critical prowess while providing very distinct routes into the professional world.

Creative entrepreneurship and employability is something we are passionate about and it is embedded throughout our course. Many of our students have formed their own theatre companies and are supported by QMU

Are you passionate about theatre? See yourself as a future director, performer, playwright, deviser, stage manager, scenographer, workshop leader or producer? Our exciting and innovative mix of theoretical and practical modules will enable you to try out all of these roles and then focus on your career aspirations.

as they set up their businesses – including the chance to be located in our graduate start-up space called the Business Innovation Zone. The world's largest arts festival happens right here in Edinburgh and many students successfully perform, produce or get involved in the Festival Fringe.

By the time you graduate you will know how and why a theatre team brings a performance to life, and the many ways in which drama can be understood and made relevant to contemporary audiences.

In Years One and Two you will work in collaborative experimental workshops, finding creative solutions to the staging and performance of classic and contemporary genres and texts. Bringing a range of interests and skills (performing, directing, playwriting, dramaturgy and scenography), students will share their different perspectives and insights. Lectures will also cover theatre history and critical and performance theory, which will inform the decisions students make in their creative work.

In Years Three and Four you will study core modules plus optional modules allowing you to focus your interests in specific areas. You'll also have the opportunity to study abroad* or go on placements. In Year Four you will complete a personal final project, which can be a practical or a written dissertation.

Careers: You may know that you want to work in the theatre, yet don't know exactly which route you can take to make this happen. This course will literally take you behind the scenes and open your eyes to a broad range of theatre-based careers, including playwriting, directing, scenography, producing, screen industries, acting, community theatre, contemporary performance practice, and drama teaching, as well as communications professions and postgraduate study. At QMU we have a lively and dynamic careers service who will help guide you through your choices.

About you

I am from East Kilbride and in Year Four of the Drama and Performance degree.

My weeks are often chaotic, I fill my free time with as much activity as possible. I enjoy long walks around the old town and going to pubs with my friends. Many of my evenings are spent at the theatre. I'm a member of Creative Electric, a company for young artists to create contemporary pieces of theatre.

How did you come to choose this course and why QMU?

The Drama and Performance course is unique in Scotland: no other university offers a course which provides such a broad knowledge of theatre. From the origins of theatre, the evolution of both British and Scottish theatre to contemporary performance techniques, the course offers a stable knowledge in several aspects both practical and theoretical. Lecturers know from first-hand experience how the industry works and strive to push you in a professional manner. The broad range of modules teach performers, stage-managers, technical, directors and everything inbetween the skills necessary for their craft by lecturers who have done exactly what you want to become and offer knowledge to help you advance in that field.

Why did you choose to study in Edinburgh, Scotland?

I'd like to say I didn't choose Edinburgh, it chose me. It is such a beautiful city and I was so lucky to be given the opportunity to study here.

Life in Edinburgh

My favourite thing about living in Edinburgh is exploring. I live right in the heart of the old town and love going out on walks and peering down old closes and visiting old buildings. Edinburgh has such a rich history and it's hard not to walk around in amazement at its beauty. One of my favourite places is Greyfriars Kirkyard. On a hot summer day, when the Meadows is packed, this is where I go to relax. It has a super view of the castle! It's also fun to watch all the Harry Potter fans trying to find Tom Riddle's grave.

The course

I attended an open day and getting to meet the course lecturers made my mind up for me. They were able to answer all of my concerns and were extremely welcoming and friendly.

To pick a single highlight would be far too hard. One highlight for me has been the artistic freedom that the course offers. Students are able to let themselves go and really be free when creating performance. I've spent days rolling around in fields, covered in glitter, learning how to fight on stage, dancing — you name it and I have probably done it on this course. I've met fellow students and now friends that I know I will work with outwith university, putting into practice the skills I have acquired.

Any advice for students who might be interested in this course?

If you are unsure of what part of the theatre you want to be a part of, apply. Even if you are decided on becoming a performer or director, apply. I came to QMU solely as a performer and have since worked professionally as a production manager at a top Fringe production, I have performed at both the Fringe and other festivals, my arts journalism reviews have appeared on a professional website... I'm still a performer, but now I have the transferable skills to go anywhere in the industry. The course has made me employable in an industry that is so difficult to get started in. If you have a passion for theatre and a determination to succeed then this course is for you.

Life as a student at QMU

I was a member of Cobweb Theatre Company/Society and I was elected Vice-Chair of the Society. Cobweb make theatre continually throughout the year and work in a professional context. When I first joined, everyone was very friendly and supportive of ideas and work. With Cobweb, I've performed in two plays in Edinburgh — 'Fear and Misery' and 'The Provoked Wife' — and each was a great success. Cobweb gives the chance for everyone, regardless of course or ability, to come together and make theatre.

What's your 'top tip' for making the most of being a student?

Enjoy it! Make sure you have plenty of down time and relaxation time. Explore Edinburgh and more importantly, make sure you have a night or two in Hive. I've learnt that the best way to get through uni is to have time for yourself and friends among your studies.

What are your plans when you graduate?

It's soon, so I better start thinking! My ambition is to continue creating theatre; Facepalm Theatre is a company we're developing in a current module and it is my hope to continue making theatre with my friends as part of this company. I also have plans to take a solo performance to the Fringe and hopefully beyond.

BA/BA (Hons) Theatre and Film

And... ACTION! Film and theatre are thriving industries, both creatively and commercially. This course gives you a unique chance to study these two exciting disciplines in depth and in tandem, developing your passion for live and recorded dramatic performance and preparing yourself for a rewarding career.

You'll learn about the histories of theatre and cinema, and examine the key critical cultural and political debates. You'll explore the spaces of the stage and studio, stage and screen performances and the genres, narratives and authorship of plays and screenplays. We also study the economics and management of theatre and cinema within the creative industries.

Year One modules will give you a broad understanding of how theatre and film work as creative industries. You start your study of theatre and film narrative and performance, and gain experience of creative production.

Year Two examines questions of genre and creativity alongside the theory and practice of stage performance. In Years Three and Four you'll look at key periods, movements and practitioners in theatre and film drama, alongside modules in areas such as adaptation, comedy, playwriting and Hollywood cinema. You can create your own production projects and choose additional, optional subjects like photography or community theatre.

Alongside the course's academic core you will have plenty of opportunity to gain production experience from Year One, and can specialise in practice areas in later years.

The global media industries have never been so influential in our politics, our society and our individual lives. Our film, media and communications courses offer you the opportunity to engage with debates in these fields and to develop highly valued industry-relevant skills.

You'll study the way in which the media industries work, and gain the practical expertise you'll need to make a difference as you build your career.

There are three specialised BA (Hons) routes within this subject: Public Relations and Marketing Communications, Media and Communications, and Film and Media.

standard. During your degree, you will learn from and meet professionals in the fields of media and communications. In addition, you will be working with carefully selected external clients on media and communication projects. Elective modules ensure that students on this course can shape the programme towards their future career aspirations.

Our Film and Media course gives you the opportunity to study film as an artistic, cultural and commercial enterprise. You'll engage in deep critical thinking about culture, media and society as a whole. You will develop real-world technical skills in video and media production, as well as teamwork, academic research, project management and a variety of forms of communication. Modules in the first two years will introduce you to key developments in film and media, including the emergence of cinema and the establishment of national broadcasting systems, alongside key concepts such as narrative, popular culture and citizenship. In later years you will be able to choose from a range of electives that allow you to tailor the course to your own particular interests.

All of our film, media and communications courses give you the chance to learn practical skills and approaches that will enhance your business sense and employability. Many of our students have gone on to create their own successful companies and we have an in-house Business Innovation Zone (BIZ) to help you get your enterprise up and running.

Why QMU?

Our Public Relations and Marketing Communications course gives you an unrivalled opportunity to study two closely aligned disciplines. You'll gain practical experience of developing strategic PR and marketing communication solutions for live clients, creating authentic digital content for a range of social media platforms. You will also build strong links with real-world clients throughout your four years here, and we work closely with industry employers to ensure that the course teaches the skills they are looking for in graduates.

On our Media and Communications course you will study theories of media and communications and debate the role of media in economics, politics and society. You'll also put this theoretical understanding into action through a media production strand that focuses on video, audio and online content creation. Assignments will develop the writing, management and team-working skills needed to produce imaginative and creative work of a high



wireless microphones, Adobe Premiere Pro, DaVinci Resolve Studio complete with colour-calibrated editing suites. We also have one of only two 'infinity' green screen facilities in Edinburgh. For photographic work, students have access to a range of cameras including Canon DSLRs with specialist lens and lighting equipment, and post-production software including Adobe Lightroom.

Across all three courses the first two years are a combination of specialist and shared modules, giving students a thorough grounding in the subject area. You will learn about the historical forces that have shaped the media industries and you will engage with debates on contemporary topics in the field. For example, this is a very apposite time to be studying the role of publicity, propaganda and social campaigning in our contemporary democracy.

The media industries are rapidly changing and we are continually updating our modules to keep up with the latest changes in the communications landscape. No matter which course you choose, you will learn about the artistic and creative digital work that shapes the societies we live in. You will also gain a wide range of transferable skills, such as creating digital content, making presentations, undertaking research, managing social media and developing client briefs, further preparing you for a variety of workplaces and careers.

Our staff are well connected to industry and employers are supportive and complimentary about what our students learn. All of our courses include specialist guest lectures from a range of practitioners and visiting professors. Furthermore, we actively encourage and support all students to gain some work experience while on their course. Public Relations students benefit from a compulsory placement while industry-based learning opportunities are an integral part of all three degrees. Our students tell us that work experience is an invaluable part of their course work, enabling them to put what they have learnt into practice and a number of students have secured permanent positions through the contacts that they have made.

Many of our students snap up the opportunity to study for a semester abroad during their course and we have University partners in Australia, Canada and the USA (subject to availability).

Research

The majority of our staff are actively engaged in cutting-edge and inspirational research that they continually reflect in the course material. Recent and ongoing scholarship includes: critical dialogue, engagement and action research; informational justice; critical PR; melodrama in film; TV comedy; the music industry; global journalism; film festivals; and Scotland on Screen.

On this course you'll study film as an artistic and commercial enterprise, as well as various media institutions and the debates surrounding them. You'll engage in deep critical thinking about culture, media and society as a whole.

You will also develop real-world technical skills in video and media production, teamwork, academic research, project management and a variety of forms of communication. Modules in the first two years will introduce you to key developments in film and media, and key concepts in film and media studies, including the emergence of cinema and the establishment of national broadcasting systems, and concepts like narrative, popular culture and citizenship.

In Years Three and Four you choose specialist film and media options in, for example, television drama, screenwriting and photography. You can also spend a Semester in Year Three studying abroad with one of our exchange partners. In Year Four you complete a written or production dissertation. Production dissertations can be in video, photography or screenwriting. You can choose a group production dissertation which adds another dimension if you want to specialise in a particular production role such as director, writer or editor.

Structure

You can opt to study for an honours degree over four years or an ordinary degree over three years. You will complete a range of modules each year as outlined.

Teaching, learning and assessment

You will be taught in lectures, seminars and in practical workshops. We have superb on-campus resources including a film editing suite and TV studio. You will be assessed in a wide array of ways across the course, including presentations, reflective diaries, blogs, videos, essays and some written exams. Interview with Calum Duff –
BA (Hons) Film and Media graduate

Calum Duff, 22, from Edinburgh, graduated with a BA (Hons) Film and Media from QMU in 2017. Calum's company, Front Edge Media, is now based within the Business Innovation Zone at QMU, where the company benefits from access to small business start-up support and professional filming equipment, as well as guidance from the campus-based Business Gateway.

Why did you choose to study film and media at QMU?

I'd always been interested in video production and did a lot of film and photography in school.

I'd heard that the QMU course was great and very practical-based, which was what I preferred rather than a heavily theory-based degree.

I also attended a QMU Open Day and it was very useful in terms of getting to know the University a bit more. I think the thing that made up my mind was the general look and feel of the campus, it was clearly very new, and the facilities seemed very up to date.

What was the highlight of the course for you?

Towards the end of my degree, I chose to focus on the practical side of filming, where my strengths certainly lie.

I still use the skills and experience gained from those classes to this day.

I made all of my friends through my course as well, which was great as we were able to bond over our shared enjoyment for film and media.

The most interesting part of the course for me was a module in which a group of us worked with an external client and produced some media content for their business. This is what sparked my interest in creating a business of my own that provides promotional material for other brands and definitely gave me an insight in how to kick things off.

What is your top tip for future students considering this course?

If you're interested in this course, I'd say go for it! It has really helped me shape a better understanding of film making and build my knowledge of real world applications."

What have you been doing since graduating from QMU?

I set up my own business, Front Edge Media, before I graduated, so once I had graduated I was able to dedicate more time to networking and gaining more clients.

I also secured work experience through Santander Universities SME Internship Programme at QMU, which allowed me to create promotional videos for the Mercat Bar and Grill in East Lothian. The owner of the business put me in contact with a lot of people and many of my clients have been through him.

My Santander Internship with the Bar and Grill has been an invaluable experience and it was a very beneficial starting point for Front Edge Media.

My client base is slowly building up and I'm very excited for what the future holds for my business."

Communications

Our Media and Communications course will engage you in creative, collaborative and professional ways of thinking, researching and working. The degree emphasises studying the media and understanding the importance of creative communication skills in this exciting and dynamic sector.

We live in a world where everyone joins in media debates and many people are content creators, but how do you differentiate yourself, and your professional skills, in this field? On this new course you'll study media theory while gaining the creative, practical and collaborative skills you'll need to establish a career in tomorrow's global, digitally networked world.

What media and communications knowledge and skills will you need for the many roles which require them in the fast-moving world of work? You will study theories of media and communications and debate the role of media in economics, politics and society. You will look at the role of publicity, propaganda and social campaigning, and you will learn about the artistic and creative digital work which shapes the societies we live in.

You'll also put this theoretical understanding into action – although this is not a dedicated production course, it does have a production strand that focuses on video, audio and online content creation. You will develop your writing, management and team skills needed to produce imaginative and creative work of a high standard. During your degree you will be meeting and learning from media professionals in the fields of media and communication. In addition, you will be working with carefully selected external clients on media and communication projects.

The course is designed to build your creative, critical and research skills year on year, as well as your ability to put ideas into writing and practice.

Creative Entrepreneurship is a vital part of Years Three and Four. You'll learn skills and approaches that will enhance your business-sense and employability. Many of our students have gone on to create their own successful companies and we have an in-house Business Innovation Zone (BIZ) to help you get your enterprise up and running.

Marketing Communications

Public relations and marketing communications are fascinating, fast-moving fields that offer many rewarding career opportunities. Thanks to modern media and the voracious consumer appetite for digital content, they are constantly evolving and on this course you'll enjoy frontline professional experience and tuition informed by cutting-edge scholarship.

This course gives you an unrivalled opportunity to study two closely aligned disciplines: public relations and marketing. Organisations often take an integrated approach to communication, bringing together these two disciplines to help drive success. PR manages relationships with a range of stakeholder groups including employees, the government and the media, while marketing focuses on relationships with the customer.

You'll gain practical experience of developing strategic PR and marketing communication solutions for live clients, creating authentic digital content for a range of social media platforms. You'll find out how organisations use video, photography, blogs and podcasts to drive their marketing, and how you can help them do it better. You'll undertake original research to inform decision making, and measure the effectiveness of campaigns using a range of analytics. Students also gain a wealth of experience through a work placement as well as having the opportunity to study abroad at one of our partner institutions (subject to availability). You'll be taught by internationally renowned academics who are still actively engaged with the industry. Industry practitioners will see you in action and many of our graduates have gone on to work with contacts that they made on the course.

This course will give you the theoretical understanding, professional experience and industry contacts you need to step into an exciting and rewarding career in public relations (PR) and marketing.

In Year One key concepts in PR and marketing are covered and essential practical skills developed. Students look at the history of the industries and current practice, and debate the role the industries play in economics, politics and society. You also consider contemporary communications practice and the importance of producing dynamic and creative content including video, photography, blogs, infographics and social media posts that are relevant to target publics.

Year Two expands your knowledge and understanding of professional practices in PR and marketing. Students consider how organisations campaign on issues and communicate with external stakeholders through the media and internally with employees.

In Year Three, the principles of planning are expanded upon from the perspective of those who manage marketing and PR activities. Concepts of strategy and persuasion are introduced and research skills are strengthened. Students gain an insight into advertising and experiential marketing where the audience is immersed in an event such as a music festival and how this emotional response is used by organisations to build brand awareness, trust and loyalty. In Year Three students can start to tailor their learning around their interests through the selection of an option.

In Year Four, students are encouraged to work more independently, develop their critical skills and follow their own area of interest. This happens through working on your dissertation research project, working in industry on a one-month placement and choosing options from across the two disciplines.

Interview with Adrian Crighton — BA (Hons) Public Relations, Marketing and Events*

About you

I really enjoy the community learning aspect of the University. I have always thought that I would rather go to a friendlier and more supportive university and make a bigger impact than go to a larger university and just be another face in the crowd.

For nearly a decade before coming to QMU, I was a classical ballet dancer and was heavily involved with a lot of theatre work. My current favourite pastime is mountain biking and I have a golden labrador named Holly.

What's been the highlight of the course so far?

What has stood out for me on the BA (Hons) PR, Marketing and Events programme at QMU so far was volunteering at the Chartered Institute of Public Relations (CIPR) Scotland PRide Awards, which is a black tie event celebrating the top PR campaigns of the year. My favourite assessment (never thought I would say that) was the crisis news conference, where you need to sit on a panel representing a hypothetical organisation undergoing a crisis while your lecturers role play as journalists. I thought this was great because it gives you real experience in dealing with situations and is not just a sit-down exam.

What's your advice for making the most of being a student at QMU?

Be prepared to throw yourself into absolutely every opportunity. It's really important that you take advantage of the many personal development schemes that QMU has to offer. Your whole experience here will be so much richer as a result.

Probably the biggest highlight of my time at QMU so far has been my involvement with the STARS Programme, which I'm now co-ordinating. STARS stands for Student Tourism Ambassador Role Scotland.

In this role I'm getting valuable work experience over and above the academic knowledge I'm learning on my degree, including looking after nearly 40 students across four work experience locations in Edinburgh over the summer. This available experience is improving my confidence and developing my leadership skills, so it's a real boost for my CV.

What are your plans after graduating from QMU?

After I graduate I hope to pursue a career in corporate communications.

Health Professions

Our School of Health Sciences at QMU offers the largest range of professional healthcare courses of any university in Scotland.

Our courses are designed to create work-ready healthcare graduates – professionals who think critically and are ready to challenge current practice. In other words, we prepare you for a career, not just your first job.

We are currently in the process of developing our four year BSc (Hons) health professions degrees into four year undergraduate integrated master's degrees.

For entry in 2020 onwards, we will offer the following courses:

As a graduate in a health professions subject you will be in demand with employers, work-ready, and eager to progress in your chosen profession.

Studying at QMU, you'll learn from engaging, encouraging staff who practise at the leading edge of today's issues. Your classroom learning will be supported by real-world clinical placements, involvement with pioneering research, first-class facilities on campus and professional accreditation.

We have built links between our undergraduate teaching and our master's pre-registration* courses. Learning alongside experienced students will enrich your academic experience. Furthermore, cross-school teaching and interprofessional working are important components of our courses, allowing you to engage with other professional learners who will be your peers in the working environment.

Working together as students helps to break down barriers between professions before entering the workplace.

All our courses are approved by the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC) where required. This professional recognition is augmented by the excellent links we have with the NHS across Scotland and through our collaborations with private, occupational, social service and other care providers. So you can expect relevant placements and fascinating lectures on current topics from respected visiting specialists.

You'll hone your practical skills in our well-equipped school which has specialised teaching facilities and state-of-the-art laboratories. These include a clinical simulation suite, working clinics, research laboratories and a suite for the measurement of human movement using three-dimensional motion analysis, human performance and neuromuscular analysis.

Our approach to learning and teaching

Clinical practice and experience (placements) are vital in the health professions, and we'll help you prepare for this exciting challenge from Year



One. Practice experiences take place across Scotland and some courses allow elective placements which may be overseas. All module work, theoretical or practical, relates to professional practice or directly to the work engaged in clinical placement. You'll learn in state-of-the-art simulation laboratories and clinic treatment rooms to emulate best practice. Interprofessional learning is a key theme in all our pre-registration degrees. We introduced a new interprofessional learning experience from 2019 which will develop your team-working and communication skills, understanding yourself as a key member of the multidisciplinary team, and introduce working in small groups with volunteer patients in the safe environment of the University. In practice you will develop interprofessional links, learning to understand the role and boundaries of each profession and become aware of different or shared healthcare leadership working practices. You will also discuss the changing practices of healthcare in the UK and the wider workings of the NHS, private practice or industry.

We support student learning through classroom sessions, tutorials, work groups and practical classes, and through web-based learning, which is particularly important for clinical placement. Use of a clinical or personal development portfolio is undertaken on some courses, and this complements the wide range of assessments used across the disciplines. On some courses you can choose optional modules, depending on the demands of professional learning.

Research

Understanding research helps you to develop and enhance critical thinking and clinical questioning, essential skills in the challenging healthcare practice of today.



Our School research has four main fields: rehabilitation sciences; clinical nutrition; speech and communication; and health care policy and practice. All students have the opportunity to engage with the wide range of research being undertaken in several ways, for example, as novice researchers during project work, being trial participants or attending keynote lectures and seminars. Clinical research can only be undertaken in collaboration with frontline health providers and we have numerous collaborators in NHS Boards in Scotland, private and social services, and internationally in Europe and further afield.

You'll be taught by lecturers and PhD students who have published research in internationally renowned academic and professional journals. We want our research findings to mesh with your learning to keep this as up to date as possible.

Career prospects

Our undergraduate degrees will give you the professional skills and expertise you need for a rewarding career. We will also help you to develop skills which will be useful not just in healthcare professions, but in many other roles in life. Many of these skills are embedded in our teaching and practice, and we will actively encourage your learning in verbal and non-verbal communication,

understanding team work, presentation skills and delegation. Our graduates gain posts in hospital and community positions throughout the world, but some choose to enter different career paths, for example in research, healthcare management, private practice and industry, sports-related roles or in health promotion and fitness. Not all graduates enter the NHS for their first role but for those who do, employment in the NHS often starts with part-time or a 'bank' position in the first instance, gaining experience in a variety of clinical areas and types before making a more permanent choice. More and more new opportunities for recent graduates are developing in the private sector, social services or industry, which all require a healthcare background. You could also choose to progress straight to higher degree learning on an MSc or PhD course.

*Pre-registration courses allow graduates with a relevant first degree to move into a healthcare profession through a two year postgraduate course.

Master of Dietetics (MDiet)

Dietetics is a fascinating field that focuses on the management and prevention of nutrition-related disorders at an individual, group and population level. Dietitians are the only regulated health professionals that assess, diagnose and treat dietary and nutrition-related problems at an individual and wider public health level.

Dietitians have the opportunity to work in a diverse range of settings including but not limited to health and social care settings, private practice, the food industry, research related roles and government advisory roles. There are many strands of knowledge that you will master on your way to a career as a dietitian. This course has been carefully structured to integrate theoretical study in different fields with the practical experience to develop the skills required to work as a graduate dietitian.

In Year One you will study a range of modules that provide you with the fundamental knowledge, principles and concepts that underpin the practice of dietetics. You will be introduced to the role of the dietitian, the role of food in health, human physiology, genetics and biochemistry. You will also develop skills in communication, information technology and academic study skills. Students are also invited to begin to engage in our peer-mentoring scheme, which provides additional support during the transition to university life.

In Year Two you will continue to develop your academic study skills and further develop your knowledge and understanding of the concepts relating to health and nutrition, while beginning to integrate biological and social sciences. You will also undertake your

first practice placement block. This will consist of two weeks on campus and two weeks within a Scottish health and social care setting.

Year Three develops your knowledge and communication skills further, begins to have a more applied focus and is more clinically orientated. This helps to prepare you for your second practice placement block (12 weeks duration) within various health and social care sectors across Scotland.

Year Four provides you with an opportunity to reflect on and consolidate what you have learnt on your placement at the end of Year Three. It also allows you to undertake an individual research-based project in order to develop your knowledge and skills in this area. You will also undertake your third and final placement block (12 weeks duration) within various health and social care sectors across Scotland.

Structure

This is a four year integrated undergraduate master's course. Students commence the course with a view to graduating with a Master of Dietetics (MDiet) in four years. Years Three and Four will be taught alongside postgraduate students studying on the postgraduate Pre-Registration course. There is also an option for students to choose a BSc (Hons) route at the end of year two and they will still be eligible to apply for registration with the HCPC as a dietitian.

Teaching, learning and assessment

You will be taught in face to face or online lectures, seminars, practical workshops and laboratories. Outwith

This four-year integrated master's course will give you the theoretical understanding and practical skills that you will need to build a rewarding career as a dietitian. Practice placements are an integral part of the course and allow students to put their theoretical knowledge into practice.

timetabled sessions you will be expected to continue learning through self-study. You will be assessed by a variety of assessment methods (eg written and practical exams, case studies, written assignments and presentations) at the end of each module or semester.

Placements: Placements provide the opportunity to integrate practice with theory. You will complete around 1000 hours of practice-based learning delivered as one four-week placement in Year Two (two weeks on campus and two weeks in practice), one twelve-

week placement in Year Three and one twelve-week placement in Year Four. QMU manages the sourcing and allocation of placements for each student on this course in partnership with Health Boards in Scotland and other universities in Scotland which deliver dietetic education. Placements are randomly allocated to students as part of a Scottish wide allocation process. To enhance future employability placements take place across a variety of health and social care settings in any of the Health Board areas across Scotland. It is therefore likely that students will have to relocate for at least some of their practice based learning unless they have individual requirements (eg specific health needs or school age children) that mean they must remain in a specific location. The additional costs associated with placement travel and accommodation are the responsibility of the student. Students who receive SAAS funding may be able to claim for some of these expenses to be reimbursed.

About you

I am from Kinsale, County Cork and I am currently in my final year of the Dietetics course. I have always had a keen interest in health and nutrition and the preventative role that diet can play in the management of certain health conditions.

Why QMU?

Why did you choose to study at QMU and what attracted you to the course?

On choosing a university to study dietetics, I attended the QMU open day and I was very impressed with how modern the university was. I liked the small size of the University and how helpful the staff were in providing information surrounding the course. I really liked how everything I needed was within close proximity to campus and I felt this was very important for my first time living away from home. QMU has an exceptional reputation for healthcare courses and the dietetics course is very well respected. Also, an added bonus to living on campus was the six-minute train to Edinburgh, which is such a vibrant and beautiful city that felt like a second home for me.

About the course

What have you most enjoyed about your course?

Dietetics has been a challenging but extremely rewarding course to study. I have gained so much knowledge and experience across different health conditions such as cancer, rehabilitation, chronic kidney disease and gastrointestinal conditions. I have just completed my dissertation which primarily focused on availability, cost and nutritional implications of a low FODMAP diet in irritable bowel syndrome. I have really enjoyed my placement experiences within acute and community settings which allowed me to apply the theoretical knowledge that I learned in class to clinical practice. QMU primarily focuses on interprofessional education and teamworking in healthcare through Interprofessional education modules so I had a good idea of what it would be like working with other members of the multidisciplinary team such as physiotherapists, nurses and speech and language therapists.

Dietetics can be quite a demanding and intense course, so time-management and prioritisation of workload is important. I found that QMU were very supportive with any concerns that I had throughout the duration of the course and my personal academic tutor provided me continuous advice and guidance on all aspects of university life if I felt like I was struggling.

Life as a student at QMU

Have you joined any schemes/initiatives to enhance your learning and development

I am an active member of the British Dietetic Association (BDA) and I have been involved in numerous projects tailored towards public health nutrition. Most recently, I represented the BDA at the Food Matters Live 2019 conference in London, promoting their 'One Blue Dot' campaign which focused on environmentally sustainable diets. I am currently working on writing an article for 'Dietetics Today' surrounding this project and my aim is to try increase awareness surrounding volunteering opportunities for dietetic students. Moreover, I am a member of some BDA specialist groups, which primarily focus on specific areas of dietetic practice including mental health and sports nutrition – two areas of dietetics that I am particularly passionate about.

Are you a member of a QMU club or society

I am a member of the QMU Dietetics Society and have thoroughly enjoyed attending talks across all areas of dietetics.

What has been the most valuable lesson that you've learned at university?

I think the most valuable lesson that I have learned at university is the importance of surrounding yourself with like-minded and positive people who support you. It is important to have a network of people who are understanding when you are living away from home and it is always nice to know that you are not alone in your experiences.



Master of Nursing (M Nurse)*

Nursing demands compassion and skill and this course will fully equip you to give exceptional person-centred care. With this degree course you will be able to register with the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC) and practise as a nurse.

As a nurse, you will be at the forefront of healthcare, meeting a broad range of people who truly need your expertise and empathy. Nurses are involved in promoting health and preventing illness in addition to caring for sick and dying people. This can take place in a variety of environments, which include health centres, homes, residential/ care homes and hospitals. A career in nursing can take you into leadership and management, education and research, both at home and overseas. Wherever you choose to specialise in the future, as a nurse you will be an advocate for the people in your care. You will make a difference.

This course will prepare you to confidently deliver safe, effective and person-centred nursing care. It will offer you the chance to be part of a community of learners, working collaboratively with lecturers, clinical staff, service users and other students on a transformational journey towards registration. You will actively engage in creative and critical ways of working and learning including approaches such as critical inquiry, reflection, contemplation, simulation and practice learning experiences.

Year One: Knowing self and others. This year focuses on the foundations of professional nursing care. You will explore a range of influences on health, professional issues, skills for nursing practice, and the bio-sciences to inform person-centred care. You will focus on the healthy person and healthy communities. You will begin to learn to meet the needs of people across the

lifespan and what the key health challenges may be both nationally and internationally. We will also focus on supporting and facilitating your own self-care, incorporating contemplative learning approaches. Clinical skills learning will prepare you for practice learning experiences in a variety of settings.

Year Two: Knowing self, others and society. In this year, you will build on learning from year one and learn how to plan and evaluate care in a person-centred way. This year will also focus on facilitating and supporting health and self-care in persons/family/carers. You will learn how to assess and care for people as they cope and adapt to ill health, combining science subjects with nursing care. Clinical skills learning will prepare you for practice learning experiences in a variety of settings.

Year Three: Knowing how to develop self and others. This year will concentrate on the care of people with complex needs and increasing dependency in a range of settings. Making person-centred judgements and decisions will be a focus. Leadership skills will also be further developed in this year and the promotion of person-centred cultures in care environments. You will explore healthcare governance and research evidence relating to effective, compassionate nursing practice. Further clinical skills learning will prepare you for practice learning experiences in a variety of settings and you will develop knowledge of the integration of health and social care through engagement with the voluntary sector.

Year Four will focus on integrating previous learning to enable you to graduate as a registered nurse with advanced skills. There will be completion of a portfolio and development of research themes related to current healthcare priorities to

This is a new four-year integrated master's degree in nursing, with the option to exit with a BSc (Hons) Nursing. The course will prepare you with the knowledge, skills and leadership qualities for a successful and rewarding career in nursing.

support development of a dissertation/ final project. Final year skills work will involve more advanced assessment and practice learning experiences. This will prepare you for registration and include preparation for prescribing in the future and supervising students when registered.

Structure

Students will commence their studies with a view to graduating with a Master of Nursing (M Nurse) in four years. There is also an option for students to choose a BSc (Hons) route at the end of year two and complete the final two years at that level. For both routes, students will be eligible to apply for registration with the NMC as a registered adult nurse.

Over the four years you will complete a total of 4,600 hours of theory and practice experience which is split equally. The hours will be the same for the BSc (Hons) and master's route. The main difference is the credit level of the academic work which will be higher in the master's to allow for a higher level final qualification.

Teaching, learning and assessment

Our aim in developing our new nursing course was to use a range of creative ways of teaching and learning to promote self-development and the skills for interacting with others. You will also be facilitated to learn in lectures, seminars, practical laboratories and have practice learning experiences. Outside of timetabled sessions, you will be expected to continue learning through self-study. We also aim to include creative ways of assessment which may involve student choice. Assessments will include practical and written exams, assignments and group work.

Why QMU?

Your theoretical learning will be complemented with practice in our Clinical Simulation Suite and in a variety of health and social care settings.

Small classes mean you will benefit from individual support from our highly experienced course team.

We are ranked top in Scotland and joint top in the UK for student satisfaction in Nursing in the National Student Survey 2019.

Modules

The course is currently in development and exact module names cannot be confirmed at the time of printing (Feb 2020), however, the new course content will be aligned both to the NMC Standards for Future Nurse Education and to the Person-centred Framework for Nursing (McCormack and McCance, 2019). We will therefore focus our learning units on parts of the framework which are: Metaparadigms, Pre-requisites, Care Environment and Person-centred Processes. There will also be a focus on group learning within a learning set and this is where you will build a personal portfolio.

Many have moved outside the traditional idea of a uniformed nurse in a hospital to forge careers in the community, the Forces and postgraduate studies.

Interview with Gareth Pocock — BSc (Hons) Nursing

About you

I am a final year student on the BSc (Hons) Nursing. I was born in Melbourne, Australia, but have lived in Edinburgh for around twelve years. It was never really my plan to settle in the UK, but this is where life has brought me. I love living in Scotland: it's such a beautiful country.

Why did you choose to study nursing at QMU?

Studying nursing was a career change which has proved to be an excellent choice. I have mainly worked in retail and was looking for a new, more satisfying challenge. Over the years I have worked as a farm hand, a youth hostel assistant, a ski lift operator, a supermarket cashier and even a rickshaw runner. Most of my previous jobs have been working with people and that's an aspect of nursing I really enjoy.

I came back to study as a mature student after about fifteen years out of formal education. I had studied at a tertiary level previously, but had never really taken full advantage of my qualifications, so was pleased to be studying something new. I've enjoyed the challenge using my brain again and learning new concepts.

What do you like most about studying at QMU?

When I visited QMU for the interview process, I was impressed with the quality of the facilities and the staff I met, and I was keen to apply.

I've enjoyed my nursing course so far and have learnt a lot. The best part is going out on clinical placement and working in a variety of settings. I've had a great range of hospital and community placements and worked with lots of great nurses and other healthcare professionals.

Some of the experiences have been difficult and challenging, but it has certainly been a good part of my nursing education. The night shifts are a bit tough, but it's part of the learning process.

Do you have any top tips?

My top tip for anyone about to start at university is to stay organised and try to make a start on work as soon as possible. I like knowing when all of my deadlines are for the year so that I can have them in my mind and work towards them. Then I can try to have some time away from studying to spend with my family and friends. I think it's important to maintain interests outside of university.

I would certainly encourage people of any age who are considering a career in nursing to apply. It has been a positive move for me and I'm confident that I will have a good future career as a nurse. Doing some volunteering, perhaps on a ward or similar, is a good way to get a taste of nursing beforehand and will look good on an application. I'm not sure where I will end up working, but I'm sure it will be somewhere here in Scotland.

Master of Occupational Therapy (MOccTh)*

Students commence the course with a view to graduating with a master's degree in four years. This course is responsive to demands of the health and social care sector and there will be practice-based learning opportunities across the course to integrate theory, knowledge and practice.

Living, not existing – that's a primary objective for the profession. As an occupational therapist, you will work with individuals, groups and communities to foster participation in the aspects of life that people need, want and have to do. This course is your first step towards a rewarding and diverse healthcare career with excellent employment prospects.

On this course you will explore how to provide practical support to empower people, facilitate health and wellbeing, and help identify and respond to barriers that prevent people from doing what really matters to them.

You will learn a wide range of transferable personal and professional skills – understanding why and how people engage in occupation and what might disrupt patterns of occupation; critically engaging with knowledge and evidence that informs the profession; collaborating with services to address needs of their communities. You will also develop an appreciation of how individual's lives can be shaped by society including environments, history, or systems and how these factors can impact on health. You will learn through a variety of approaches including interactive lectures, workshops, group work and self-directed learning. Practical placements are a key element of the course, giving you the opportunity to translate your learning into practice and to work with a wide range of

services and populations. There is a practice placement offered in each of the four years, and in total you will complete 31 weeks of full time practice-based education.

In Year One you will study a range of modules that provide you with the knowledge and concepts that are foundational to occupational therapy practice. You will be introduced to different perspectives on occupation and its centrality in everyday life, as well as its relationship with health and wellbeing. You will also develop skills in communication, information technology and academic study skills.

In Year Two you will focus on occupational therapy processes (assessment, goal setting, intervention, evaluation) with individuals and communities. You will explore disruption and deprivation of occupation (personal and contextual factors), across the life span. Aspects of public health and health promotion will be introduced and revisited in the later years.

During Year Three you will critically explore issues related to practice, theories and systems. You will also study the social construction and complexity of knowledge and practice. You will develop further understanding of leadership, practice development and innovation in thinking and action.

Year Four consolidates your master's-level learning opportunities and builds upon your previous knowledge and practice experiences in diverse and changing contexts. This year will include community partnership working, project development and deepening leadership skills.

Interprofessional learning and working is an integral part of professional practice and will be incorporated throughout the course.

This new four-year integrated undergraduate master's course will give you the expertise, people skills and conceptual understanding that you will need to work as an occupational therapist.

Structure

This is a four year, full-time integrated undergraduate master's course. You will complete a range of modules each year, and a final project in Year Four. Students on this course will complete 600 SCQF credits across the four years, with sufficient credits in the final year to enable graduation with a Master of Occupational Therapy (MOccTh). There is also an option for students to choose a BSc (Hons) route at the end of year two and they will still be eligible to apply for registration with the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC) as an occupational therapist.

Teaching, learning and assessment

Our course is designed to allow you to get to know your peers and our staff, and build positive academic and professional relationships. You will be taught in lectures, seminars, practical workshops and small groups. Outside these timetabled sessions, you will be expected to continue learning through independent study. For assessment, we focus less on written examinations and more on demonstrations of knowledge and understanding: reports, essays, presentations, oral and practical examinations, and creative assessments.

The course will enable you to work as part of a health and social care team. You will develop leadership and partnership working skills and you may wish to engage with further professional development or higher level academic learning opportunities.

QMU will offer a three year ordinary degree in Paramedic Science for the first time in 2020. The role of the paramedic is to assess, treat and manage people in both emergency and non-emergency situations. Paramedics work in a wide range of environments and may work alone or within a team of other health and social care professionals.



The new BSc Paramedic Science course will provide students with the necessary skills and competencies to deliver out of hospital care, in a range of health settings as a member of an integrated health and social care team. To do this QMU works closely with the Scottish Ambulance Service.

Over the three years you will learn how to respond safely and effectively in emergency and non-emergency situations. You will develop skills of assessment, diagnosis, management and treatment of people. Your learning will be underpinned by evidence. Topics in the course include: biological sciences, management of health and illness, communication skills, person-centred practice, leadership and management. We will help you to develop as a critically thinking, reflective professional who is able to work independently or part of a team.

Structure

The length of the course is three years. You will complete a range of modules each year.

Teaching, learning and assessment

You will learn through face to face sessions and on-line. Learning and teaching approaches include lectures, seminars, practical laboratories and placements. We also use case based approaches, interactive learning, group work, simulation, virtual reality and games. Outside timetabled sessions you will be expected to continue learning through self-study. Assessments will include practical work, written exams and assignments.

Master of Physiotherapy (MPhysio)*

This exciting new four year integrated master's course will equip you with the expertise and practical skills that you need to work as a registered physiotherapist in the private or public health and social care sector. You'll thrive in our supportive environment and benefit from placements in each year.

Physiotherapists are healthcare professionals who use person-centred approaches to make a difference to people's lives. Physiotherapists work in a wide range of settings and focus on the management and prevention of problems relating to movement and function across the life-span.

In Year One you will study a range of modules which will equip you with the basic knowledge and skills for physiotherapy practice. Topics covered will include: anatomy, physiology, biomechanics, aspects of psychology, professional practice, basic assessment skills, common physiotherapy interventions and evidence based practice. A short foundation placement will introduce you to the application of theory into practice.

In Year Two further modules will expand your skills relating to cardiorespiratory, neurological and musculoskeletal physiotherapy. You will broaden your understanding of health and wellbeing and the role of the allied health professional in influencing health behaviour change. You will be encouraged to develop your skills of critical thinking and using information to support your studies. A further placement will give you the opportunity to continue your learning in practice.

Year Three develops your skills further to look at the management of people with more complex conditions. You will broaden your awareness of healthcare and challenge your understanding of health education and promotion. Two further placements will expand your practice knowledge.

In the final year, you will consolidate your practical, theoretical and professional skills through both

university and practice based learning placements. You will explore how the development of leadership, innovation and entrepreneurial skills can contribute to meeting the challenges of contemporary health and social care. In addition you'll work with a project supervisor to plan, carry out and evaluate a small scale research project.

Across all four years part of your learning will take place in a variety of real health and social care settings. You will work (supported by a registered physiotherapist) with patients, their carers and families, and with other health and social care professionals. These practice-based placements are invaluable and will enrich your learning in all levels of the course. You may be placed at sites across Scotland, and will be required to cover any associated travel and accommodation costs.

Master of Podiatry

Podiatry (MPod)*

This course, delivered by staff with an outstanding reputation for the quality of teaching, will equip you with all the knowledge and skills that you require to work as a podiatrist. You'll develop your expertise through in-depth theoretical learning, clinical placements in each year and the close support of our very experienced staff.

As a podiatrist you will be a healthcare professional who has been trained to diagnose and treat abnormal conditions of the feet and lower limbs. Podiatrists also work with their patients to prevent and correct deformity, keeping people mobile and active, and helping to relieve pain. Podiatrists work with people of all ages, and your patients will count on you to support and help them with a broad range of mobility and medical conditions of the foot and lower limb. These may include muscular and joint problems as well as broader health issues such as diabetes, blood disorders and disorders of the nervous system, which may also involve complex wound management.

The Year One modules will include introductions to anatomy and physiology. You will also study pathophysiology and microbiology, as well as beginning to learn about lower limb and foot conditions. You will be prepared for clinical practice by developing your communication skills and exploring the professional requirements to allow you to become a podiatrist and to work as part of a team. This will involve you in developing key skills to allow you to begin your professional development journey as a podiatrist. In addition, to assist your transition into university level study there will be a focus on academic and research skills including

essay writing and how to access information to support your learning. An early introduction to podiatry in the form of learning about clinical practice on placement provides the opportunity to allow you to integrate into the clinical environment.

In Year Two you will undertake modules which explore human walking and musculoskeletal problems. You will continue to broaden your understanding of health and wellbeing and how to influence and facilitate behaviour change. Academic skills will be further developed by exploring how knowledge can be acquired, applied and integrated into practice. You will also learn more about medicine and pharmacology. You will continue to develop your practical skills through further supported clinical placement.

Year Three modules are designed to enhance your critical thinking, research skills and further develop your knowledge of foot and ankle imaging modalities. You will be broadening your healthcare awareness and challenging your understanding of health education and promotion, as well as developing your key skills in working as part of a multidisciplinary team. You will be extending and strengthening your knowledge and skill in research. You will continue to link theory and practice during a range of clinical placement opportunities.

Interview with Yang Kang —

Podiatry

I am Yang Sern Kang and a 21 year old BSc (Hons) Podiatry student from Subang Jaya, Selangor, Malaysia.

Why did you choose to study in Edinburgh/Scotland?

I think Scotland is home to some of the most stunning landscapes in the UK, along with its unique culture and traditions. Everyone knows about kilts, bagpipe players or ceilidh dances, and even the Loch Ness Monster legend, but there is more to Scotland than these iconic elements.

Scotland is known for its friendly welcome, and that's no myth. Scottish people are glad to help people from all over the world, giving a warm welcome, along with their distinct accent.

I would say the best experience I've had in Scotland so far was visiting the Highlands and Isle of Skye, where I was offered breathtaking views of snow-capped mountains and experienced thick snow for the first time. I still have plenty of time to visit the wonders that Scotland has to offer and I look forward to travelling on the iconic Hogwart's Express.

Why did you choose to study BSc (Hons) Podiatry at QMU?

I chose podiatry because of its specialisation in the lower limb. This includes a range of clinical practices such as diabetes, sports injuries, biomechanics, nail surgery, wound care, paediatrics, biomechanics and orthotic manufacture. This will open up a spectrum of roles and a lifetime full of opportunity.

I see podiatry as a profession on the rise, especially in Malaysia where one fifth of the population have or had diabetes due to our diet rich in carbohydrates.

I also chose to study the course at QMU because it is approved and recognised by the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC) and this is strengthened by the excellent links QMU has with the NHS across Scotland. I stand by QMU's approach to learning and teaching by believing that clinical practice and experience (placement) are of major importance. QMU appreciates that clinical practice is core to healthcare and therefore helps students prepare from year one, unlike the other universities.

What has been the highlight of the course for you so far?

The most interesting part of the course is clinical placement. We get practical hands-on experience in preparation for practice by treating real patients and trying to diagnose their problems and complaints accurately. It's enjoyable to have conversations with your patients and just share our experiences.



Master of Radiography: Diagnostic (MDRad)*

This course, delivered by staff with an outstanding reputation for the quality of teaching, will equip you with all the knowledge and skills that you require to work as a diagnostic radiographer. You will develop your expertise through in-depth theoretical learning, clinical placements in each year and the close support of our very experienced staff.

As a diagnostic radiographer you will be a healthcare professional who acquires and evaluates images of the human body to diagnose disease and trauma. You will use a range of high-technology imaging equipment and techniques and work closely with the multidisciplinary team to provide a person-centred service.

Radiography is invaluable in the diagnosis and treatment of disease and trauma. As a diagnostic radiographer your skill, judgement and professionalism will be a vital part of a team's clinical work – and affect patients' lives – day after day. Awaiting a diagnosis can be a stressful time for patients and in this career you must be both technically adept, an excellent communicator and provide person-centred care.

This is why our diagnostic radiography programme places high importance on clinical placements. Placements are essential to build self-confidence, practice radiographic techniques and develop clinical knowledge, in a real-life hospital setting.

The Year One modules will include anatomy and physiology, scientific and diagnostic technological radiographic principles. You will prepare for clinical practice by developing your communication skills and exploring the professional requirements of a

diagnostic radiographer. To assist your transition into university there will be a focus on academic skills including essay writing and how to access information. A two-week placement provides the opportunity to experience and integrate into the clinical environment.

In Year Two you will undertake modules which explore more complex radiographic techniques including cross-sectional imaging and trauma. You will continue to broaden your understanding of health and well-being and how to influence behaviour change. Academic skills will be further developed by exploring the application of knowledge. You will develop your practical skills through 12 weeks of clinical placement.

Year Three modules are designed to enhance your critical thinking and further develop your knowledge of specialist diagnostic imaging modalities. You will broaden your healthcare awareness and challenge your understanding of health education and promotion. You will continue to link theory and practice during 12 weeks of placement, which includes a four-week elective placement.

Year Four provides the opportunity to enhance, consolidate and reflect on your theoretical, research, professional and clinical skills enabling a smooth transition to working life. You will explore leadership skills and innovative practice to meet current healthcare challenges. You will take ownership of your academic learning by undertaking a quality improvement project. This year includes 12 weeks of clinical placement.

In Years Two, Three and Four you will complete 12 weeks of placement in three, four or five week blocks. Placements can take place within the NHS at various locations across Scotland. QMU manages the sourcing and allocation of placements for each student on this course. You can also organise an elective placement overseas.



Master of Radiography: Therapeutic (MTRad)*

This course will equip you with all the knowledge and skills that you require to work as a therapeutic radiographer providing cancer treatment and care in the NHS and the private sector. You will develop your expertise through in-depth theoretical learning, clinical placements in each year and the close support of our very experienced staff.

Are you technically minded with an equally strong interest in person-centred care? Therapeutic radiography is a rewarding profession which brings together care and technological expertise. It is the skilled application of controlled amounts of radiation to treat medical conditions, mainly cancer and tumours. The therapeutic radiographer has shared responsibility for the planning and accurate delivery of radiation treatment.

Are you ready to make a difference? As a therapeutic radiographer you'll work with patients every day to help improve their care and their lives. You are a part of their journey, from initial referral through planning and treatment to the post treatment review. You'll be a valued member of a multi-disciplinary team providing a person-centred service. This course will equip you with the knowledge, understanding and critical thinking skills you need in this rewarding career.

The Year One modules will include anatomy and physiology, scientific and technological therapeutic radiographic principles. You will prepare for clinical practice by developing your communication skills and exploring the professional requirements of a therapeutic radiographer. You will study radiotherapy treatment and commonly

occurring cancers. To assist your transition into university there will be a focus on academic skills including essay writing and how to access information. A two-week placement provides the opportunity to experience and integrate into the clinical environment.

In Year Two you will undertake modules which explore the delivery of radiation treatment, therapeutic radiographic techniques including cross-sectional imaging, the management of patients undergoing radiotherapy treatment and cover more oncological sites. You will continue to broaden your understanding of health and well-being and how to influence behaviour change. Academic skills will be further developed by exploring the application of knowledge. You will develop your practical skills through 12 weeks of clinical placement.

Year Three modules are designed to enhance your critical thinking and further develop your knowledge of less commonly occurring cancers and specialist therapeutic modalities. You will broaden your healthcare awareness and challenge your understanding of health education and promotion. You will continue to link theory and practice during 12 weeks of placement, which includes a two week elective placement.

Year Four provides the opportunity to enhance, consolidate and reflect on your theoretical, research, professional and clinical skills enabling a smooth transition to working life. You will explore leadership skills and innovative practice to meet current healthcare challenges. You will take ownership of your academic learning by undertaking a quality improvement project. This year involves 12 weeks of clinical placement, including a two week elective placement.

This new four-year integrated master's course will give you the theoretical understanding and practical skills you will need to build a rewarding career as a therapeutic radiographer. Practice placements are an integrated part of the course and allow students to put their theoretical knowledge into practice.

We aim for all our graduates to be confident in their own professional identity and have the additional skills that will allow you to work as an effective multidisciplinary team member. This is the reason why we have implemented an interprofessional focus within all of our healthcare courses; including this one.

Structure

This is a four year integrated undergraduate master's course. Students commence the course with a view to graduating with a Master of Radiography: Therapeutic (MTRad) in four years and the eligibility to apply for registration with the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC). Years Three and Four will be taught alongside postgraduate students studying on the Pre-Registration course. There is also an option for students to choose a BSc (Hons) route at the end of year two and they will still be eligible to apply for registration with the HCPC as a therapeutic radiographer.

Teaching, learning and assessment

You will be taught in lectures, seminars, tutorials, practical workshops. There will be a mix of classroom and online learning. Outwith timetabled sessions you will be expected to continue learning through self-study. You will be assessed by a variety of assessment methods (eg written and practical exams, written assignments, presentations and viva voce) at the end of each module. See the course entry on our website for more information.

Why QMU?

You'll enjoy a very high level of support and mentoring from our staff. We don't take as many students as some institutions, so you will enjoy a more individual and interactive learning experience. We have excellent relationships clinical departments allowing us to support you constantly while you are on placement. You will be the only student on the team during your placements. You'll learn on specialist hi-tech facilities on campus. Our purpose-built planning suite is equipped with Varian Eclipse Planning System which facilitates teaching in all areas from cross-sectional anatomy, radiotherapy physics, radiotherapy planning / treatment and oncology management. This facility is used for direct teaching and is also a resource for students to use independently for consolidation of their own learning.



Master of Speech and Language Therapy (MSpeech)*

This new four year integrated master's course will equip you with all the knowledge and skills that you need to start a rewarding career as a speech and language therapist. You'll learn the theory of speech and language therapy, and placements will immerse you in a variety of clinical environments. We are passionate about original research and you'll have the chance to specialise in an area that inspires you.

Our ability to communicate with others is a vital part of who we are as individuals, and how we fit in with society. Speech and language therapists play a vital role in assessing and treating people who have communication and swallowing difficulties, both developmental and acquired. Clients can be of all ages, from newborn to the elderly. If you are passionate about applying scientific principles to support communication and want to make a difference to others' lives, we can help you forge a fascinating career.

On this course, you will develop a strong theoretical understanding of speech and language therapy through modules in linguistics, psychology, biological and medical sciences, and research methods. Regular clinical placements will build your practical skills.

Year One will provide a grounding in development across the lifespan in the areas of physical sciences, linguistics and psychology. To facilitate your transition into university there will be a focus on academic writing and how to access appropriate information. You will develop knowledge and apply it at observational placements in local early years settings and primary schools and with older people, usually in a social care setting.

Year Two focuses predominantly on childhood and developmental speech, language and communication disorders. You will continue to build your knowledge in physical sciences, linguistics, psychology and research

methods with increased application to clinical areas. You will develop your clinical skills through weekly placements in local clinics in Semester One and a block placement at the end of Year Two.

Year Three will provide an opportunity to develop research and critical thinking skills. You will enhance your clinical decision making skills (assessment/goal setting/management planning/outcome evaluation) through case studies and in-class discussions. You will focus on disorders of communication acquired in adulthood and related to sensory, cognitive and physical impairments. You will explore different areas of practice through clinical masterclasses. You will continue to link theory to practice as you attend clinical placements during the semesters

Year Four will provide the opportunity to enhance, consolidate and reflect on your learning to date. You will continue to develop your skills in research, professional development, and current and advanced clinical skills enabling a smooth transition to working life. You will explore leadership skills and gain an understanding of key skills for collaboration and training. You will complete your academic learning by undertaking an appropriate and focused research dissertation. This year includes 20 days of clinical placement.

We aim for all of our graduates to be confident in their own professional identity and have the additional skills that will allow you to work as an effective multidisciplinary team member. This is the reason why we have implemented an interprofessional focus within all of our healthcare courses; including this one.

Structure

This is a four year integrated undergraduate master's course. Students commence the course with a view to graduating with a master's degree in four years. Students have the opportunity to transfer at the end of Year Two to a BSc (Hons) route. On successful completion of either four year route, students will be eligible to apply for registration with the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC) as a speech and language therapist.

Teaching, learning and assessment

You will be taught in lectures, seminars, practical workshops and laboratories. Outside these timetabled sessions you will be expected to continue learning through self-study. You will be assessed by a range of assessments throughout the course.

Why QMU?

We have two health science courses: BSc/ BSc (Hons) Nutrition and BSc/ BSc (Hons) Physical Activity, Health and Wellbeing. These multidisciplinary courses focus on healthy living and prevention of lifestyle diseases such as obesity and diabetes.

The first year of the Nutrition course will ground students in the health sciences needed for a career in nutrition. Community-based public health and health promotion competencies are developed throughout both courses. You will get first hand experience of evaluating the impact of your knowledge and skills in placements off campus and in your final year research project.

Our approach to learning and teaching

Different people learn in different ways and so we have a range of teaching methods. As well as traditional lectures and seminars, you'll learn by working on group and individual projects, practical classes, web-based material and communication/IT workshops. You'll be assessed through written assignments, individual and group presentations, laboratory and project reports, short tests and oral examinations. Overall, assessment is less exam-based in later years. As a graduate, you will need a professional development portfolio. We support you in building your portfolio by integrating this into course assessment. Practical learning is central to our health sciences courses. For example, visiting practitioners and service users help to bring the real-world learning experience into the classroom.

We use the campus sports centre, and indoor and outdoor practical classes to emulate settings in which you may find employment during and after your studies.

In the later years of these health science courses, less time will be spent in lectures and more on student-centred and student-driven approaches. You will also move from using textbooks as course materials to a more significant use of primary research, journal articles and government legislation and guideline documents.

Research

You will be taught by lecturers and PhD students who are actively engaged with research and who publish in high impact academic and professional journals. Our aim is to ensure that our research findings link with your learning to keep this as up to date as possible. Understanding research helps to develop and enhance your critical thinking and clinical questioning, essential skills in the challenging health and social care practice of today.

All students studying on our health sciences courses have the opportunity to engage with the wide range of research being undertaken in several ways: eg as novice researchers during project work, being trial participants, or attending keynote lectures and seminars. Clinical research can only be undertaken in collaboration with frontline health and social care providers, and we have numerous collaborations with NHS boards in Scotland, private and social services, and internationally in Europe and further afield.

Career prospects

As a Physical Activity, Health and Wellbeing graduate you can build a rewarding career in voluntary organisations, the NHS, charities, local authorities and the sports and leisure industries.

Our Nutrition degree can be a stepping stone to a future in public health nutrition, health promotion, health media, the food industry, nutrition therapy and in fitness and leisure.

You may also want to develop your expertise via a higher degree (MSc, MPhil or PhD) and may wish to consider our Advancing Practice in Health Framework of postgraduate courses.

BSc/BSc (Hons)

Nutrition

On this accredited degree course you'll learn the science and social importance of nutrition in a modern university with advanced equipment. Real-world voluntary experience will foster your practical skills and you'll have the chance to study abroad.*

Nutrition affects everyone in the world every day. What and how we eat is vital to individual and community health and it is an engaging and rewarding subject to study. You'll learn the academic principles behind food and gain practical skills in our advanced laboratories. You'll also learn how to think on a larger scale. What are the social, political, cultural and environmental factors affecting what we eat? How can nutritionists use evidence to support behaviour change at an individual, community and population level? What are the most current issues in the field of nutrition?

If we are what we eat, then nutrition can tell us a lot about who we are, how we live and how we can improve the health of society. As a science it looks at how food affects the functioning of the living organism. It includes the study of food composition, how it is digested and absorbed, the production of energy, elimination of wastes and all the syntheses that are essential for growth, maintenance and reproduction across the life cycle.

In Years One and Two you'll forge a solid understanding of the biological sciences. You'll learn the fundamental principles of nutrition and integrate this with knowledge of other related disciplines. Modules will help you develop core study and professional skills as well as laboratory and investigative (information technology and research) expertise.

In Year Three you'll look at how nutrition influences health at the individual, community and population level across all stages of the lifespan. You will learn to evaluate scientific and lay literature, and develop other key professional skills such as communication.

In Year Four you'll focus most of your time on developing your individual research project. You will also choose an elective module that interests you; either Health Entrepreneurship or Nutrition in Practice, which allows you the opportunity to develop a nutritional intervention in a population group of your choice.

Structure

You can take an honours degree over four years or an ordinary degree over three years. The modules and options for each year are outlined.

Teaching, learning and assessment

You'll learn in lectures, seminars, practical workshops and laboratories. Outside these timetabled sessions you will be expected to continue learning through self-study. You will be assessed by written exams at the end of each module or semester. For full details see the course entry on our website.

Interview with Lucie Weir — BSc (Hons) Nutrition

About you

I am from Lisburn, Northern Ireland and currently in Year Four of the BSc (Hons) Nutrition.

I chose to come to QMU because it was one of the few universities offering a nutrition course. I'm really interested in health and the positive effects that food can have on your body when you nourish it with a balanced diet. I had wished to study nutrition then further my studies to complete a postgraduate degree in dietetics. However my plans changed as soon as I began the BSc (Hons) Nutrition because I knew it was exactly right for me!

I love cooking and have created a blog called "Juicy Lucie Foods", which contains lots of simple, nutrition-packed recipes, which I've enjoyed making while a student. I've also set up a granola business which I plan to launch following graduation.

Living away from home

I lived in the halls of residence in my first year and loved it because I met friends there who I know I'll have for life. I moved to live in Edinburgh city centre for second and third year. I'm living in Glasgow at the minute with my husband and commuting to QMU. This is very do-able, because there is a train station right next to the QMU campus."

When living away from home, the top three things I couldn't be without are: 1. my dressing gown, 2. Physical Activity,

Health and Wellbeing

If you are seeking a career drawing on your interests in physical activity, health and wellbeing, this course will equip you with the skills you need to succeed in a wide range of relevant roles within different settings. Equally as important, it will kindle your passion to go out into the world and make a real difference in a field you truly care about.

Everyone knows that being physically active is good for health. So why do some people find it hard to make positive choices? How can we use science and creativity to support more people to be active and healthy? This is a fascinating and empowering subject that needs a broad range of knowledge and skills, including anatomy and physiology, professional communication, health promotion and sustainable community development.

You'll study the theory and practice of promoting healthy behaviours such as physical activity, and participate in community engagement activities in different environments with a wide range of service users. This is a course that will make you think differently about the world and the community around you. For example, did you know that if you teach a primary school child the very simple skill of catching a ball, they are more likely to be coordinated, to enjoy team sports in high school and to be active throughout their whole life and so less likely to be overweight and unhealthy?

Student joining the course in Year Two will study health issues in the community. Exploring issues together with input from community groups will expand your understanding of real-world problems related to health and inequalities. All the skills and knowledge for working as a personal trainer and in exercise referral will be covered, including an introduction to healthy eating, food and nutrition.

Years Three and Four have a broader scope, looking at service provision, developing an understanding of working with community groups and organisations such as charities and care homes. Studying entrepreneurship, leadership and sustainable community development, you will learn how to identify community and organisational needs related to health and wellbeing, and design a sustainable solution to a particular issue. The process and solution you develop will draw on experience from the community engagement opportunities and will form a significant part of the work required for your final year dissertation.

Structure

Students joining this course with a HND can opt to study for an ordinary degree over one year or an honours degree over two years. For those joining with an HNC, you can opt to study for an ordinary degree over two years or an honours degree over three. You will complete a range of modules each year as outlined.

Teaching, learning and assessment

You will be taught in lectures, seminars, practical workshops and laboratories. Outside these timetabled sessions you will be expected to continue learning through self-study.

You will be assessed by a combination of written exams, practical demonstrations, oral presentations and assignments at the end of each module or semester. For full details see the course entry on our website.

Students in Years Three and Four of our courses benefit from QMU's Employer Mentoring programme, which offers the opportunity to meet with experienced professionals who have a wealth of industrial insight relating to all our degrees. The mentee-mentor relationship allows students to develop

networks and increase their confidence and employability in their chosen field of study.

We are a member of the Chartered Association of Business Schools, and our BA (Hons) Business Management with Finance course is accredited by the Chartered Institute of Management Accountants (CIMA).

Business Management

Business is one of the cornerstones of society. Equipping graduates to interact with a variety of business sectors remains key to the development of both individual careers and economic prosperity at a national level.

The UK will need 1.9 million new managers by 2024, according to the 2016 Working Futures report. Our Business Management degrees are designed to equip students to become these managers of tomorrow: leaders who will make a positive contribution in the public, private and third sectors.

Invaluable work experience will be gained on placement in Year Four, where you will be operating in the best possible environment to learn those higher-level management skills required by tomorrow's companies, and to consolidate the knowledge acquired throughout your programme of studies. In addition, in Year Three you can choose modules that inspire you, and gain the opportunity to study abroad.

In Years Three and Four you can tailor your degree and study Business Management with another subject – Enterprise, Finance or Marketing – and make your skills stand out.

Events and Festival Management

The UK events industry is an area of growth: it is worth £39.1bn – 35% of the UK visitor economy – and employs 530,000 people in 25,000 events businesses. Conferences and meetings, exhibitions and trade fairs, corporate events, outdoor events, sporting events, music events, cultural events and festivals as well as a plethora of emerging smaller and community-based events are all booming.

Our BA/BA (Hons) Events and Festival Management course has for over ten years given students in-demand events expertise, and we continue to update its practical and academic elements to stay on the pulse of contemporary developments. With a strong emphasis on management, the course will prepare you to lead, plan and deliver a live event, and to evaluate its outcome. It also offers a four-week work placement where you will gain valuable applied experience.

International Hospitality and Tourism Management (IHTM)

International hospitality and tourism is a fast-moving and thriving industry where you can make a name for yourself. There are fabulous opportunities, many of them on our doorstep! In Scotland alone the sector is worth more than £11 billion and employs more than 218,000 people. Its success has created a growing demand for highly qualified professionals, at all levels, to continue to develop the sector. Hospitality and tourism is a global industry and a QMU IHTM degree opens doors for our students across the world including a high-quality 20-week hospitality and tourism management internship.

We have links with many different hospitality and tourism organisations worldwide including the Institute of Hospitality, the Tourism Society, the Scottish Tourism Alliance and the Hospitality Industry Trust. These connections offer opportunities to attend conferences and workshops, and to apply for scholarships to spend time abroad.

Our approach to learning and teaching

Our degrees are modular. In Years One and Two core modules in each degree will give you a grounding in your chosen area. As you progress, you will begin to learn more about your particular area and all of our courses offer the opportunity to select modules in which you have a particular interest in later years. With our Business Management degree you can even tailor your degree and study the subject with another.

You will participate in stimulating learning environments from lectures, seminars and workshops, to field trips and 'study abroad' options. Our courses include workplace experience, and, as industry is extremely supportive of our courses, you will benefit from hearing guest lectures from a range of practitioners and visiting professors. You will also gain insights into high-profile companies such as Bacardi, Social Bite, Skyscanner, Google and Edinburgh Airport, whose representatives have joined us as visiting speakers recently. Developing contacts and networks is key to gaining an understanding of the industry, to securing work experience, and to gaining employment on graduation.

Assessment methods vary and include a balanced combination of examinations, written reports, essays, presentations and peer assessment. Our assessment methods include formative and summative components, so students receive early feedback on progress made and can use this to inform final assessment coursework.

Research

You will be taught by active academics who are doing research in their own right. Some colleagues have recently completed their doctoral studies, and others are publishing in mainstream academic journals. Such engagement is key to the relevance of our courses, and helps equip staff and students with the background to make intelligent decisions about their future.

You will also have contact with our growing number of PhD students as you progress through your chosen route of study. This will allow you the opportunity to interact in an informal and collegiate way with those engaged in the highest levels of academic activity – and perhaps to discover that their enthusiasms accord closely with your own. At QMU the door to academic advancement is an open one!

As you reach the later stages of undergraduate study, there are opportunities to develop individual pieces of research through the dissertation, and those students who choose further study at master's or doctoral level are encouraged to pursue these interests.

Careers

Our IHTM graduates have gone on to successful careers in a variety of public sector organisations such as Disney World, VisitScotland and EventScotland. Many others are carving a career pathway with Sheraton, Gleneagles, Malmaison and Hotel du Vin, Hilton, RF Hotels, as well as many smaller privately owned companies in both tourism and hospitality. Some students have started up their own hospitality or tourism business.

Our Business Management graduates are proving their worth to companies in the UK and internationally and have left QMU to embark on a wide range of successful careers in various sectors such as the financial sector in organisations such as Royal Bank of Scotland, Capita, Standard Life Investment and Lloyds Bank. Many of our graduates enter management training programmes in companies such as Diageo, Enterprise Rent-A-Car, John Lewis and Marks and Spencer. Others have set up their own businesses, entered teaching or taken their learning further as postgraduate students.

Graduates from our Events course have gone on to participate in a wide range of professional environments: running their own event agencies; working for prestigious international event companies; becoming wedding and event planners at luxury venues; managing international events such as the Commonwealth Games; leading in events technology organisations; shaping event policy at EventScotland and Edinburgh City Council or pursuing postgraduate degrees in this emerging research field.

Some students decide to undertake further academic study, perhaps at QMU on our MSc International Management and Leadership, MSc International Marketing, MSc Accounting and Finance with CIMA or MSc Gastronomy, to enhance their business career or as a prelude to doctoral research.

BA/BA (Hons)

Business Management

More and more employers require business management graduates who can join their companies and hit the ground running. This degree will give you both the theoretical business knowledge and, crucially, the practical experience you need to make your professional mark from day one. You'll also have the opportunity to study abroad*.

Let's talk business. When you study for a degree in business management at QMU you'll gain a deep understanding of the nature and core functions of businesses. How do successful companies manage their resources? What's the best way to make an organisation environmentally sustainable? What marks out a successful entrepreneur?

You can study a general business management degree or (after two years of general study) decide to focus your learning on the enterprise, finance or marketing elements of business management.

People do business with people. If you have first-class management skills and practical expertise, people are going to want to be in business with you. The best companies will want you. That's why our business management options are designed to give you the knowledge and skills that you need to thrive as a business leader and manager in the fast-moving marketplaces of tomorrow.

All students enrol on the general business management degree for Years One and Two. This is when you'll build a strong foundation in core business management areas – marketing, economics, finance, human resource management, entrepreneurship, digital business and law.

In Year Three you'll choose which of the four named routes you wish to specialise toward. You can study for a general business management degree or focus on one particular area such as enterprise, finance or marketing. This will allow you to graduate with a specialist award, for example in BA (Hons) Business Management with Enterprise.

Whichever business management path you take, you'll be equipped with the skills employers are looking for – negotiation, project management, problem solving, critical thinking and team working.

Your practical business expertise will be honed by placements, guest speakers from the business world, business projects and the creation of your own business plan. You'll also have the opportunity (subject to availability) in Years Two or Three to study for one semester at a university overseas in North America, Canada, Hong Kong, Europe, New Zealand or Australia.

Structure

You can study for an honours degree over four years or an ordinary degree over three years. You will complete a range of modules each year as outlined opposite.

Teaching, learning and assessment

You'll be taught in lectures, seminars and practical workshops. Outside these formally timetabled sessions you'll be expected to continue learning through self-study. You'll be assessed by a range of methods such as written exams, reports, poster presentations, business plans, live pitch, group presentations and negotiation role play.

Why did you choose to study BA (Hons) Business Management at QMU?

I really enjoyed business subjects throughout my time at Broxburn Academy. I decided to study BA (Hons) Business Management at QMU as the course covers a wide range of business related topics and I could choose which employment area I wanted to go into after I graduated.

I visited QMU during an open day and I loved the friendly size of the campus compared with other universities in Edinburgh. Most importantly, QMU's graduate employment rate is very high too.

I love how modern the QMU campus is and that everything is in the one place. QMU is also a very 'green' and socially responsible university, which is something I'm very passionate about (the topic of my dissertation). QMU has such an embracing, friendly environment which makes you feel welcome.

Why did you choose to study in Edinburgh/Scotland?

I never really considered moving away from home as I'm close to my family and friends. Edinburgh is such a beautiful place and I felt there was no better place to study than Scotland's capital city!

What was the highlight of the course for you?

I really enjoyed the Business Management course. I learnt so much over the four years. I have been able to put this knowledge into practice during the early part of my career when I managed large groups of staff for a national restaurant chain, and currently as I develop my own specialist food business 'Fodilicious'.

I think the most interesting part of the course for me was the dissertation in my final year. Carrying out research on a topic that you are so passionate about is such a great experience and although it's a very challenging time,

the hard work really pays off when you get good results.

What are your top tips for future BA (Hons) Business Management students?

If you have a real interest in business, but are not sure which business path you'd like to embark on, it's helpful to know that QMU's BA (Hons) Business Management covers everything from accounting and human resources to entrepreneurship and procurement. Once you discover what subject you're most interested in during the course, you can consider what specific area of business might suit you best in your graduate career.

What have you done since graduating from QMU?

I graduated with a first class BA (Hons) Business Management degree. Throughout my time at QMU, I worked my way up in a popular restaurant chain, from a host, to a waitress, to a shift manager. After graduation, I took on a General Manager position in a high volume restaurant in Edinburgh city centre and became the company's youngest store manager in the UK. I had a team of 25 people working for me and I was responsible for the profit and loss of the store. It was a fantastic experience, and I could put into practice everything I had learnt throughout my time at QMU, including developing marketing strategies, operations management, business strategy and finance.

Tell us about the food business you set up?

In recent years, I discovered a gap in the market for fresh, healthy convenience foods suitable for people coping with various digestive disorders including irritable bowel syndrome (IBS). I used my personal experience of IBS, which I had experienced in my early 20s, and my business skills, to plug the gap. In September 2017, I created Fodilicious, an innovative and UK exclusive food manufacturing business providing convenient, healthy meal options following the low

FODMAP diet, (IBS-friendly). My specialist foods and convenience meals are helping IBS sufferers to live a better quality lifestyle. Our products are also gluten-free and dairy-free too, effectively positioning Fodilicious in the fast growing 'free from' food market.

How has QMU supported your business development?

I have continued my relationship with QMU since graduation, particularly since establishing my business. I have worked closely with the food specialists within the Scottish Centre for Food Development and Innovation to develop new products. I am a tenant of QMU's Business Innovation Zone and have been extremely well supported by QMU's Business Development Manager, who has helped me network and showcase my specialist food products to different audiences. She has also put me forward for several highly prestigious awards, which has proven very fruitful. In 2018, I won several awards and support from organisations, which is helping me further develop my business. Amongst my wins, I was one of only 20 entrepreneurs to win a £45k Royal Society of Edinburgh Unlocking Ambition Enterprise Fellowship Programme. I was runner up in the finals of the Santander Universities Entrepreneurship Awards, where I was up against some of the country's most ambitious entrepreneurs from the UK's top universities. I also won £10k in the Scottish Edge competition, which supports entrepreneurs and start-ups. I thank QMU for supporting me through the awards process.

Would you consider further study at QMU?

Yes, of course! At QMU, I learnt that the business environment is always changing. I believe that you have to continuously learn and study to keep up with change. But for now, I'll concentrate on the development of my business and continue my relationship with QMU through my tenancy of the University's Business Innovation Zone.

Rewarding for you as a student

Studying through our Graduate Apprenticeship (GA) in Business Management will boost your professional development and employability. You will study the same core modules as full-time business management students, covering core management areas such as marketing, business law, research methods and strategy. There will also be work-based learning modules throughout your degree, allowing you to complete projects designed to support your employer's business goals and objectives. You will benefit from guidance, mentoring and one-to-one supervision.

Each year of the apprenticeship is structured around two 11-week semesters. You'll attend lectures, seminars and workshops on campus one day a week during term time. Outside of this formal tuition you will continue to develop your expertise at your workplace and through independent study of around six hours per week.

Your fellow apprentices will likely come from very different organisations and have a range of experience. This will be a stimulating and rewarding stage in your professional and personal development – and a unique networking opportunity.

Management

An event is like an iceberg, and the performance that the audience sees on stage is just the tip. Behind that lies the 90% of unseen hard work done by the events manager and their team. On this course you'll learn about the nature of events and how to design, manage and deliver them. You'll gain invaluable practical skills running a live event and consulting with events industry partners and have the opportunity to study abroad*.

Could you plan, deliver and orchestrate an event such as a music festival? Where would you start? What would you need to consider? You'll know all this by Year Two of this course. By Year Three you will understand who your audience is and what makes them return and promote your event for you.

The events business has grown exponentially in the last 20 years, from pop-up food fairs to corporate events, fashion shows to festivals like Glastonbury and school sports days to the London Olympics. Events help drive the strategies of businesses, charities and public bodies, and there is now a growing cadre of supremely capable events professionals. They know all about planning, management, legal issues, budgeting, staging, marketing, promotions, evaluation and social responsibility. This course will teach you those skills and give you that experience and more.

You'll also learn how to think critically about issues such as sustainability, crime, social justice, inclusion and what happens when the party is over. There are political considerations too, as many events and festivals are used to encourage tourism, regenerate communities and stimulate local economies such as our own world-famous Edinburgh festivals. Leading industry figures will bring your learning to life in guest lectures.

In Years One and Two you will focus on the specifics of events and festivals management, plus general management skills such as marketing, accounting and human resources. In Year Two you will put theory into action when you plan and deliver a live event. Our students have organised unforgettable fashion shows, music nights, charity dinners and sports days, often raising

thousands of pounds for charities in the process.

Years Three and Four will deepen your understanding of how events and festivals relate to national and international strategic issues, such as how cities use events for image development and investment purposes. You will also look at audience development and engagement – why do some ideas catch on instantly while others fade into obscurity? This is when you will refine the focus of your learning, choosing the elective modules that you are most passionate about. If you continue to honour, you will also undertake a consultancy project for an events industry partner and a dissertation in an area of your choice.

Finally, you'll be learning all of this on a campus just six minutes by train from the heart of the city with the biggest arts festival on earth.

About you

Tyler is 22 years old and from Edinburgh. After she got the chance to run an event at work, she realised she wanted to pursue a career in events management. She did an apprenticeship to get the grades for college and then passed her HNC and then HND in Events Management. This provided her with the qualifications to move directly in Year Three of the BA (Hons) Events Management at QMU. Tyler was concerned she wasn't university material, but with determination and the help and support of QMU's student services team and her Personal Academic Tutor (PAT), she is performing well on her course and developing a passion for the events industry.

She tells us more about her work in the industry and her experience of studying in both further and higher education.

Why QMU?

Why did you choose QMU and this particular degree course?

I helped to organise an event at my work and that's when I realised that organising events was what I wanted to do as a career. I chose to study at QMU because I didn't really want to study away from home and QMU was closed to where I lived. I also went on a field trip to QMU with my college class. The Events Management professor was one of the speakers at the conference and he really inspired me to further my education. After the visit, I knew I wanted to progress in Events Management at QMU.

What did you do before coming to QMU? Were you at college?

I was at Edinburgh College and I studied Events Management – HNC and HND.

Did you face any particular challenges in your educational journey before coming to QMU?

I didn't do very well in school – in fact, I didn't get the entry qualifications to undertake a HNC. However, I was employed and they realised how determined I was to further my education. As a result, they put me on a modern apprenticeship programme in order to satisfy the entry requirements for college. I never thought I would continue with my education at university until I realised that I was able to complete the work successfully.

How did you feel about coming to QMU?

I was nervous and scared that I wouldn't do well. After not doing well at school, and struggling to get to college, I thought I was out of my depth applying to QMU. My perceptions have changed enormously since then.

How did you settle into university life? What support networks/initiatives were in place to help you get to grips with university level education and general student life?

The Direct Entry Induction Week was incredibly helpful – mostly because ex-direct entry students were there to offer advice and guidance. All QMU students are allocated a PAT and my PAT really was a great help. I knew I could turn to him for advice and support on my work. I also had a mentor for my dyslexia who helped me adopt strategies to overcome my difficulties.

What were the most useful/helpful services that you used at QMU?

My PAT was very helpful. QMU has a Wellbeing Adviser, who is part of the Student Services Team. I often met with her and she really helped me get through difficult times.

The course

What was the most interesting part of the course?

The core events modules are really interesting. I really enjoyed learning about events and regeneration – like how events can assist to enhance a city's image and legacy. I also found global justice and events really interesting – knowing about the dark side of events such as the lack of human rights – it was a real eye opener.

What were the course challenges and what do you consider to be your successes?

The reading. There was a lot of reading to do compared to college and I was struggling to keep up with it all. However, I was later diagnosed with Dyslexia, which explained a lot of the doubts I had and some of the struggles I was experiencing. The help I received from QMU's disability team was great and it meant that I learned to develop strategies to help me keep up with the reading.

Can you share what opportunities you had to develop practical skills relating to your course?

I worked part-time at Volunteer Edinburgh as the Events Co-ordinator, so that was great experience for me to gain while studying the same subject.

Any advice for students who might be interested in this course?

Go for it! The course is interesting and fun.

Did you undertake any paid/voluntary work and if so, how did you juggle the demands of this with study/family life etc?

I worked part-time with Volunteer Edinburgh. At first, it was two days per week (14 hours) but once I went into fourth year I asked to decrease my hours to one day a week. It was challenging but manageable. It was great that my employer was very encouraging of my studies and offered me a level of flexibility. It was also beneficial for me to undertake work that was in the same capacity as my degree.

Extra curriculum activities

I helped with Direct Entry week. I was one of the assistants, wearing the green t-shirts and directing new students to their timetabled sessions. I was also a Student Leader with the new Peer Assisted Learning Scheme (PALS). It's where students in the year above facilitate sessions to the year below on modules. We help the students with planning their work and

give advice and techniques to help them tackle seminar work and assignments.

After graduation

What would you like to do once you graduate?

I want to work in the private sector, perhaps organising corporate events, but I am open minded and would be delighted to try difference experiences within the events sector.

Are you currently working?

I'm currently working full-time with Festivals Edinburgh. I am assisting the Project Manager on the delivery of the Festival City Volunteer programme. My job entails promotion, recruiting and managing volunteers, managing volunteer hubs and assisting the Project Manager with any other tasks.

Would you consider further study?

Yes, but not right now.

I would like to gain more experience in the field first.

Why QMU?

The course, in partnership with Dakota Hotels, has a unique Student Experience Fund that helps pay for a range of extra-curricular student activities across the four-year course. Enjoy lunch in a Michelin star restaurant, trips to a range of visitor attractions and even taste the produce on a brewery and distillery tour as part of your studies at QMU.

Our classes are small compared with some other universities, so you will enjoy more personal engagement with lecturers. We will know you by name and help manage your learning from your first lecture to graduation.

Michael Truffelli readily admits that QMU and International Hospitality and Tourism Management (IHTM) weren't on the agenda when he was weighing up his options for higher education. The decision to study at QMU, however, turned out to be a blessing in disguise and has provided him with the opportunity to work in Beijing, take up a role as Asian Ambassador of a prestigious Edinburgh hotel, and be well on his way to fluency in Mandarin Chinese! Here he explains more about his journey to QMU and beyond.

About you

Tell us a little about yourself such as your hobbies/interests that are related or not related to your course of study.

An interest that is perhaps not directly related to my course is my study of Mandarin Chinese. I have been studying the language for a year and three months since I returned from my work placement in Beijing, China. I fell in love with China during my time over there, and have since had an avid passion for both the linguistic and cultural aspects of the country.

In addition, I love to play chess in my spare time as it allows me to take my mind off work and study whilst stimulating myself intellectually. My other hobbies and interests revolve around constantly seeking new experiences through travel, cuisine and culture as I feel that opening yourself up to these elements in life truly does broaden the mind."

Why did you choose to study at QMU and what attracted you to the course?

In an effort to be completely transparent, I must say that I applied to my course through UCAS clearing upon a lack of focus in my final year of school. However, QMU and the IHTM course turned out to be a blessing in disguise, and what started as an initial

attraction for both the industrial placement offered and the opportunity to learn more about the hospitality and tourism industries, evolved to a degree that I believe is providing me with exceptional prospects upon graduation.

Why did you choose to study in the city in which your university is based?

Edinburgh is close to home for me but it is also our country's capital which created a huge appeal for me as I was eager at the age of 17 to experience life in a bigger city.

The course

What have you most enjoyed about your course? What has been your highlight?

Personally, the industrial placement was the highlight of course as it really has been life-changing in its impact.

The opportunity to travel to the other side of the world, experience a completely different culture and create a passion to pursue study of the most difficult language in the world is something that I will be forever grateful to the IHTM course for.

What have you learnt, or which particular activity has been the most interesting?

I really enjoyed the finance and accounting aspects of the course. It also goes without saying that the placements, such as the one I took to Beijing, were course highlights.

How have your lecturers supported your learning?

In general, I feel like due to the size of the classes in QMU, we are presented with a rather unique opportunity of a relatively open channel of communication with lecturers. I have rarely experienced difficulty when I found myself requiring assistance, and I've recognised the provision of support for students from the beginning of my study.

What have been some of your challenges with the course and university life? How have you overcome them?

A main challenge for me has been pushing myself to constantly read academic material when there is not a specific requirement to do so. In my school years, I was accustomed to reading only what was necessary to pass the corresponding assessments. However, in university, you should be reading alongside studying, not as your method of studying.

Getting to grips with this new reality was tough initially, but after a few years I have recognised the benefits across the board of consistent reading, from participation in seminar groups to performance in assessments. When you are studying a degree, often you are also preparing to enter the corresponding industry, therefore, more knowledge will always help rather than hinder you.

What was your placement in Beijing like?

As I mentioned, I had the incredible opportunity to travel to Beijing, China to participate in a five month work placement as a management trainee, spending four months in front office and one month in marketing and sales. Initially, I was out of my comfort zone in terms of the language and the culture but I soon began to appreciate the opportunity that I had in front of me and then excelled in my internship, developing valuable skills to take forward.

Any advice for students who might be interested in this course?

I would highly recommend IHTM as a course that is undergoing constant development. It provides you with valuable industry knowledge alongside work placement components which really ties together theory and practice, providing a very well-rounded degree.

Enhancing our student learning and personal development

Have you won any awards/scholarships/internships etc., that helped you develop skills and experience?

Through an advertisement on the QMU hub (the university's virtual learning environment and course management system) I applied and won the Lord Forte Foundation Scholarship which was pivotal to my study of Mandarin Chinese. This £2,500 fund allowed me to participate in evening classes to further my study of the language.

I was given the scholarship after submitting an essay that specified how I was eager to utilise my developing linguistic skills in the hospitality industry, recognising the exponential growth of the Chinese market.

Following the scholarship, The Balmoral Hotel, a Rocco Forte Hotel, contacted me to offer me a position with them as Asian Ambassador (which I'm doing in addition to my studies at QMU). This role has given me a unique opportunity to help pioneer strategic efforts to tap into this area of market growth.

Life as a student at QMU

What's your 'top tip' for making the most of being a student?

Recognise that while study is important, it should not stop you from having a social life. Enjoy meeting a whole host of new people, open yourself to unfamiliar experience and most importantly, enjoy the ride!

What are your plans after graduation?

Upon graduation, I plan to continue as the Asian Ambassador for the Balmoral, a Rocco Forte Hotel, on a full-time basis alongside continuing my study of Mandarin Chinese.

Psychology and Sociology

Are you intellectually curious and socially engaged? If so, you'll find the diversity and scope of the disciplines of psychology and sociology rewarding – and their dynamic methods of enquiry will offer you the academic opportunity you want.

Our academic team is passionate about both research and professional activity, using each to inform our teaching and provide a learning environment which is challenging and relevant. Our students have opportunities to gain hands-on experience by working directly with us on our research or by engaging with our networks and their interface with communities.

Our approach to learning and teaching

You'll learn through a range of methods including traditional lectures, research seminars, workshops, student-led sessions and self-directed learning. The focus is on learning how to acquire and utilise knowledge for yourself, through identifying existing knowledge as well as discovering new knowledge.

Our courses enhance a wide range of transferable skills that will open up an array of job options. You will be supported to improve your interpersonal and presentation skills, develop effective reading and writing skills, engage in analytical thinking and critical reflection, as well as focus on the development of your research skills. You will also develop skills in information retrieval, practical investigation, data collection and analysis – as well as learn how to present your ideas for a range of audiences.

You will be assessed via traditional exams and essays, but also through scientific reports, critical reviews, and live multimedia presentations and poster presentations. In the later stages of your course, you will be able to choose modules in areas that particularly interest you and which will help you develop an emerging area of expertise to give you an edge in future employment or study.

Research

Our psychology and sociology team are actively involved in a range of research interests (see division website at www.qmu.ac.uk/schools-and-divisions/psychology-sociology-and-education for details). Our research activities employ diverse methodologies and the team collaborates with a number of national and international universities and partners. We are engaged in the impact and applications of our work to real-world contexts and 21st-century issues and many of our research undertakings involve collaborations with NGOs, humanitarian, social enterprise and community groups.

Career prospects

Our courses have a strong employability focus and we'll fully support you in building your employability skills and becoming job market-ready. Around 20% of psychology graduates choose to become professional psychologists and undertake further academic study. Other graduates have gone on to forge rewarding careers in education, social services, industry, marketing, government agencies and the media. Many psychology and sociology graduates find work in areas such as social and community work, consumer and social research, marketing, education and human resource management.

Psychology

On this BPS accredited course you'll learn the skills – and the analytical abilities – that employers in a range of careers are looking for. You'll learn across six core areas of psychology (cognitive, biological, historical, developmental, social, individual differences) and gain extensive practical training in research methods. You can also focus on a particular area of interest through our module choices.

Why do humans think, feel and behave the way we do? As a psychology student you will find answers to some of the most fundamental and fascinating of questions. When you graduate, you'll be able to join the British Psychological Society (BPS), an essential step on the ladder to becoming a professional psychologist.

You'll learn to use scientific methods and evidence to understand, measure and modify behaviour. It's an incredibly diverse field, and you will enjoy a broad introduction to six core areas of psychology, including cognitive, developmental and social psychology. Later in the course you'll focus your learning on the specialist areas that interest you. Crucially, you'll learn how to think, write and critique in a scientific way, giving you the core skills you need to follow a career in the field.

In Year One you'll learn the building blocks of classic and contemporary theory and research in psychology, and will look at the historical dimensions of the discipline as a whole. You can also select from optional classes in other disciplines, including Sociology and Physiology. In Year Two you'll move towards evaluation of the core domains of social, developmental, individual, cognitive and biological psychology through a variety of teaching and learning methods, including group work, skills practice, and problem-based learning. You'll be encouraged to participate in and reflect on current research taking place in the Division of Psychology, Sociology and Education at QMU. You'll also study another chosen subject for the first semester of Year Two.

In Year Three you'll continue to critically reflect on the historical underpinning of psychology and progress your knowledge and critical awareness within the core areas. Your research skills will be further refined with the opportunity to gain experience of both quantitative and qualitative research, as well as the critical appraisal of research ethics and the identification of your Year Four dissertation project.

In Year Four you can choose modules that suit your interests and focus on real-world applications of psychology. For example, in the Contemporary Issues in Psychology module you will reflect on how you can use your psychology knowledge to approach current problems and issues in society. This year, now that you are immersed in the student research culture, you can carry out a research-based dissertation in a specific area.



BSc/BSc (Hons) Psychology and Sociology

Studying psychology and sociology will allow you to explore a large and fascinating world – the fundamental nature of human beings and how that nature shapes our social environment. You'll engage with debates about the practical, theoretical and ethical issues associated with the use of different methodologies, paradigms and methods of analysis applied in each of the disciplines, and their relevance and value for different communities and publics.

Are you fascinated by human nature, by who we are and how we interact? Do you want to understand what impacts the shape of society around us and how it could be changed for the better? Then you will enjoy our joint course in psychology and sociology as it provides a challenging and stimulating environment for exploring these questions around the individual and society.

In this course you will learn to use social scientific methods and evidence to make sense of human behaviour. You'll learn how to think and write critically, giving you skills that can be valuable in many fields. You'll be given opportunities to go into communities and apply your skills and knowledge in a real-world context and reflect upon the ways in which psychological and sociological knowledge can effect real change in people's everyday lives.

The modules in Years One and Two will give you a thorough grounding in the key concepts, theories and schools of thought in both psychology and sociology. You'll look at the historical development and contemporary applications of psychological and sociological knowledge as well as

Who are we, and how do we shape our world? On this course you'll explore both the nature of the individual and society. You'll learn the critical thinking skills that discerning employers are looking for in a variety of fields including business, health, media, education, social care and management.

explore the very latest debates in both disciplines. We know how important it is that you develop a wide range of transferable talents, so you'll also focus on improving your interpersonal and presentation skills, effective reading and writing, analytical thinking and critical reflection, as well as your research skills.

In Years Three and Four you'll develop an in-depth understanding of a broad range of substantive debates within the disciplines of psychology and sociology: the psychology of risk, the origins and structure of memory and eyewitness testimony, the sociology of gender and sexuality, sociologies of liberation, and social interaction and social order. Working closely with a member of academic staff, you will conduct your own independent research project in Year Four, in which you will be encouraged to bring together your knowledge of academic theories and concepts, as well as refining your research skills.

Your ability to understand the relationship between complex academic theory and practical research will certainly enhance your employability on completion of this course.

Public Sociology

This course encourages rigorous critical thinking on complex and challenging social issues, opening the door to a wide range of careers. This was the first undergraduate public sociology degree in Scotland and it ranked 100% for overall student satisfaction in the National Student Survey 2019.

What is the nature of society and how can we change it for the better? This is the kind of sceptical question that you'll learn how to ask – and answer – on this course. You'll learn how to critique preconceptions about social equality and justice. You'll embrace new ideas and schools of thought on this intellectually stimulating and personally empowering course. You'll graduate ready to make a real difference to people's lives.

What are the root causes of social injustice and inequality? How could we change society's perception of them, and make the actual changes themselves? On this course you'll reflect upon the ways in which sociological knowledge can affect real change in people's everyday lives.

If you have an enquiring, questioning mind and you want to understand more about human societies, social problems, interactions and experiences, you will thrive here. You'll engage with a diversity of communities and develop a sense of the ways in which a public sociological imagination can meaningfully intervene in real-world political and social events. Many of our staff are actively involved in social justice, and so you'll see first-hand how we can bring what we study to life.

This was Scotland's first public sociology course and we continue to be pioneering in the way we think. Our students have chosen fascinating and original topics to research for their dissertations – from women's body image on social media to a community campaign on gentrification.

In Year One and half of Year Two you will study a range of modules which will provide you with a thorough grounding in the key concepts, theories and schools of thought in sociology, as well as some modules in psychology. You will develop a sound understanding of the historical development and contemporary applications of sociological knowledge. Specifically this will include how sociological knowledge can help us to make sense of the public issues and concerns which affect the communities within which we live, as well as understanding the philosophical debates that underpin sociological interpretations of the world around us. In addition, considerable emphasis is placed on enhancing a wide range of transferable skills, paying particular attention to improving your interpersonal and presentation skills, effective reading and writing, analytical thinking and critical reflection, as well as a sustained focus on the development of your research skills.

From mid-way through Year Two until you graduate, you'll develop in-depth understanding of a broad range of substantive debates within the discipline of sociology with a particular focus on engaging with public issues and groups. You will refine your knowledge of sociological theory, research design and implementation, social movements and global change, sociologies of gender and sexuality, sociologies of liberation, and social policy and politics. Working closely with a member of academic staff, you will conduct your own independent research project in Year Four, in which you will be encouraged to bring together your knowledge of sociological theories and concepts, as well as refining your research skills. You will develop an ability to understand the relationship between complex

sociological theory, practical research and contemporary public issues and concerns. Our graduates find that they are well qualified for a range of jobs, further study and other life choices.

Previous graduates are now shaking things up in social and community work, consumer and social research, public policy development, teaching, academia, marketing and human resource management.

Colin graduated from QMU, Edinburgh in 2017 with a BSc in Public Sociology. Prior to enrolling on the course, Colin wasn't sure if going to university was the right choice as it didn't seem to him like something that people of a working-class background did. However, thanks to the encouragement of his parents, Colin decided to submit his application and hasn't looked back since.

About you

Why did you choose to study at QMU and what attracted you to the course?

I chose to study at QMU as everything can be found on one campus. I have a diagnosis of Asperger's Syndrome and can experience a high level of anxiety due to being on the autistic spectrum. QMU gave me the opportunity to undertake my studies without feeling too overwhelmed as everything was in one area.

I was drawn to study Public Sociology because I wanted to learn more about the society we live in. My interests lie in culture and social class, and coming from a working-class background, I wanted to learn more about these topics. The strange thing was, once I started studying public sociology at QMU, I came to realise that I knew more about sociology than I thought I did. My lecturers taught me how to articulate knowledge I already possessed into sociological meaning. Through introducing me to the works of Pierre Bourdieu, Karl Marx etc., I was given the means to understand my own experience as those theorists' ideas mirrored my own reality. So, in coming from a working-class background, I realised that sociology was a major part of my everyday life; but it was at QMU I was taught how to take my own experiences and translate them into sociological awareness.

The course

What did you enjoy most about your course? What were the highlights?

My two favourite modules were Sociology of Scotland and Engaged in Sociology, though I did enjoy all of them. With these two modules in particular, I was able to zone in on my two key interests; social class and culture, and Scottish society. I especially enjoyed working on my dissertation as it was through this that I developed my passion for writing.

How did your lecturers support your learning?

My lecturers were amazing; these were people who believed in me, which in turn gave me the belief that I could succeed in academia. I always felt that I could go to them with any concerns I had, and they would always listen to me and did what they could to support me.

I lost my mum during my final year at QMU. This was obviously devastating for me, but my lecturers were brilliant and gave me a lot of support. This is something I will always be grateful for. I really can't speak highly enough of the Public Sociology team at QMU.

What challenges did you face with the course and/or university life? How did you overcome them?

As I've already mentioned, I come from a working-class background and with this, I internalised self-doubt as to whether I would be able to keep up with the middle-class students on my course. No-one ever made me feel this way as my insecurities were driven by the nagging voice inside my head that was telling me I was out of my depth. Once I started on the course, I would listen in class as some of the other students would debate books that I had never heard of, by authors, some of whom I could barely pronounce, and it did freak me out a bit!

But the one thing that made me realise my potential to do well was limitless, and not limited, was when I began to get to know my lecturers on a personal level; all of them shared similar backgrounds to mine and I realised they had been where I was and were now where I wanted to be.

Do you have any advice for students who might be interested in this course?

My advice is to grab the opportunity to study Public Sociology at QMU if you can - you won't find a better course to be part of! The topic is fascinating, and you will have wonderful lecturers who will help support you every step of the way. Don't let your postcode decide what your life chances will be as we all possess the potential to succeed in academia, even if internalised self-doubt tells us we cannot.

Enhancing our student learning and personal development

Did you join any schemes/initiatives to enhance your learning and development such as a mentoring scheme, volunteering scheme, etc.?

I never did, but if I could change one thing about my time at QMU, it would be this. There are a lot of fantastic opportunities available to students and ones that will enhance your understanding of what you're learning and your experiences at QMU. If I could go back, I wouldn't miss out as I did - I think any of these options would be a great learning curve.

Which University services did you use to support you through your academic journey and how did they help you?

Throughout my time at QMU, I accessed Learning Support services, and what a great support they were to me. Living with any sort of disability can be challenging, so having a good support network can make the transition a lot easier and the team are very supportive.

Life as a student at QMU

What's your 'top tip' for making the most of being a student?

Just enjoy yourself and make the most of what you are learning. Your time spent at QMU, especially as a Public Sociology student, will be an amazing one. All the staff want you to succeed and there is a good social environment at QMU - you will make new friends as you learn your trade as a sociologist.

What was the most valuable lesson that you learned at university?

This sounds cheesy but it's probably 'just be yourself'. As I mentioned previously, I had self-doubt heading to QMU, but I learnt that my life chances aren't dictated by my background - it all really comes down to us. When you want to do well at something, you can do it, and with the support network like the one within the Public Sociology team you will be given every opportunity to succeed.

After graduation

Can you tell us about your life post-graduation (your career path, notable achievements, etc.)?

I am currently trying to become a professional writer. At QMU, my dissertation was focused on modern Scottish working-class writers. Through this, I found my passion for writing both fiction and non-fiction.

I write sociological short stories in Scots, and my work is heavily influenced by what I learnt while studying Public Sociology. The course really opened my eyes to the oppression of the working class, and through this I was driven to shed light on the social and cultural issues present today and to deliver an authentic voice of the working class.

I also write non-fiction on Scottish politics and culture. To date, I have been published in The Sociological Review and Bella Caledonia, as well as in So Fi Zine and few others.

Is there anything else you'd like to share about life at QMU or as a graduate?

If you have any concerns regarding the course or the wider University, don't feel daunted at the prospect of seeking help. You will find members of staff to be very supportive and understanding.

School experience : School experience is a core element of the course. Over the four years you will complete a total of 30 weeks school experience. Students will undertake four blocks of placement as follows:

Year One: Nursery-Primary 1 (4 weeks)

Year Two: Primary 2-3 (6 weeks)

Year Three: Primary 4-5 or 6-7 (10 weeks)

Year Four: Primary 4-5 or 6-7 (10 weeks)

School placements are allocated through the Student Placement System (SPS) which is automated and administered by the General Teaching Council, Scotland (GTCS). Placements are allocated by matching students to schools based on information provided by universities, local authorities and schools. Placements are based on a student's term-time address and students are not required to travel in excess of 90 minutes each way to a school placement. Students are not permitted to seek placements independently. Students are continually assessed throughout each school experience by maintaining a placement file and a portfolio of progress. All students are supported on placement by school and university tutors.

Community experience: Undertaking a community-based education experience is a unique aspect of this course and enables students to learn about the integration of formal and informal education through a range of community projects. You will complete two community education experiences as follows:

Year One — you will arrange a five-day (or equivalent hours) voluntary community experience

By law graduates must register with the GTCS before they can be employed as a teacher in a Scottish education authority nursery, primary, secondary or special school. A teacher's fitness to teach (ie in terms of conduct) will be considered at the point of application for registration.

Graduates will be provisionally registered with GTCS, and Home/EU/RUK students will be eligible to join the Teacher Induction Scheme and undertake a one-year induction in a Scottish primary school in order to become fully registered with the GTCS.

Newly qualified teachers in their probation year currently start on a salary of £26,697 in Scotland. Secondary teachers get an additional £8,000 if they choose to complete their probationary year anywhere in Scotland, while primary teachers get £6,000 extra. Once you are fully registered, this increases incrementally over the first five years from £32,034 to £40,206.

Decide on the course/s that you want to apply for

The information in this prospectus and on our website is designed to help you narrow down your course options. A visit to one of our open days can also be really helpful when deciding between different courses or universities. Applying through UCAS

To apply for a full-time undergraduate course at QMU, you must make your application through the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS). Our courses are all listed in the UCAS Search tool at www.ucas.com. In order to apply you will need our institution code, Q25, and the course code. Course codes are listed in this prospectus on the individual course information pages.

We encourage you to apply as early as possible, having made a careful and considered choice.

UCAS key dates

You can apply from September 2020 for entry in September 2021.

The UCAS deadline for on-time applications will be 15 January 2021 for the majority of courses.

QMU considers all applications

Once you've applied through UCAS, they send the application to us for consideration. You will receive an acknowledgement email from us, with a QMU application number. Keep this number safe, as you will be asked for this if you contact us about your application.

All applications submitted before the UCAS deadline will receive equal consideration. Applications received after 15 January will be considered at QMU's discretion. If you are in any doubt about making a late application, please contact our Admissions team for advice.

Where we receive a large volume of applications, and the number of places on a course is limited, the majority of our decisions will be made after the January UCAS deadline.

You can follow the progress of your UCAS application and review any offers you receive through UCAS Track.

Depending on the course you have applied for, you may be asked to attend an audition or interview before we make a decision on your application. We will contact you directly with all the information you need where this is the case.

Offer Holder Days

If you receive an unconditional or conditional offer, you may be invited to an Offer Holder Day.

These course-specific visit days are designed to provide you with more information about your chosen course, the student experience at QMU and give you a chance to experience our campus. You will also have the opportunity to meet academic staff and current students.

Accept your offer

If you decide to accept our offer, you will need to do this on UCAS Track.

Once you have received all of your decisions, you will have to reply to your offers by a specific deadline given in UCAS Track. You have three options:

- Select a firm choice – this is your first choice of course.
- If your firm choice is conditional, you can also select an insurance choice – this is your back-up choice in case you don't meet the conditions for your firm choice. We recommend that your insurance choice has lower conditions than your firm choice to give you the best chance of securing a place.
- Decline any other offers.

Applying for accommodation

If you would like to stay in our student accommodation, online applications go live in April. You can apply for accommodation if you are holding a conditional or unconditional offer.

There is no deadline for submitting your application. However, we recommend you apply as early as possible to avoid any disappointment.

Results days

If you have accepted a conditional offer from us, the next stage of your application takes place when we receive your exam results. This is known as confirmation.

If you have a conditional offer based on SQA Highers, A levels or ILC, we will usually receive these results from UCAS. We will then update UCAS Track with our final decision on your application.

If you have a conditional offer based on achieving another qualification, including an HNC or HND, you must send a copy of your transcript and final certificate to our Admissions team. Once we receive these, we'll make a decision as soon as possible on your application.

Clearing

If you didn't receive any offers, or didn't meet your conditions on results day, Clearing provides you with the opportunity to apply later in the year.

Clearing is available from 30 June and enables applicants who aren't holding any offers to apply for courses at universities which have places remaining.

Applications for Clearing will remain open until all places have been filled. Details of Clearing vacancies can be found on our website or on www.ucas.com

Joining QMU

Once you have accepted a place with us we will send you more information about beginning your course at QMU. This will include details of anything else you need to do before joining the University.

During August, once you hold an unconditional offer, you will also receive information about how to formally register with QMU. This registration process is referred to as Online Matriculation.

Once you've completed matriculation, we look forward to welcoming you on campus!

Writing a personal statement

Is QMU right for you? All you need to know before applying

As part of the application process, all applicants must write a personal statement. This statement provides a chance to tell us why you'd like to study a particular course, and what skills and experience you possess that show your passion for your chosen subject.

While every effort has been made to ensure that the accuracy of the information provided here is correct, you should note that it is advisable to check with the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) and individual universities for confirmed details.

The application process and personal statement

Applications to undergraduate degree courses will be made online through the UCAS website. In the application you will be asked to complete a number of sections including personal details, course details, education and qualification details.

The personal statement is a very significant part of your UCAS application. It is your opportunity to tell universities about your suitability for the course(s) that you hope to study. You need to demonstrate your enthusiasm and commitment and, above all, ensure that you stand out from the crowd.

The personal statement can be up to 4,000 characters in length (including spaces) or 47 lines of text (including blank lines), whichever comes first.

In your personal statement you should include:

- why you want to study the course(s) you are applying for – this makes it important to ensure that your course choices do not vary wildly.
- evidence that you clearly understand what the subject entails and any career exploration you have undertaken, including work or voluntary experience.
- confirmation that you have the skillset to succeed in your studies (eg organisational, communication, team working, time management skills) using examples where possible.

- any extracurricular interests or achievements (sport, music, part-time work), especially those which identify positions of leadership or responsibility you have held. Remember to relate how these achievements and the skills acquired may help you in your studies.

Where the demand for a particular course is very high, your personal statement takes on extra significance. For many vocational/professional courses (eg teacher training, allied health professions), evidence of specific career exploration is something we will look for as part of the selection process. For example, for applications to allied health profession courses, universities will want to see evidence that you have experience which demonstrates:

- specific experience in your chosen subject/ course area (eg visiting hospital departments or work shadowing).
- general experience of working with others (eg nursing homes, day-care centres, voluntary work).

You would be expected to highlight what you have learnt from this experience. You should also be able to demonstrate that you have an empathetic nature and an ability to work well with other people.

Supporting reference


In addition to a personal statement, your application will also require a supporting reference. This is usually written by someone who knows you academically, most commonly a teacher or college tutor. The reference should include information on:

- your suitability for higher education and academic potential.
- how you interact with other students and teachers.
- confirmation that you have good interpersonal and communication skills.
- your subject/career interests.
- if applicable, details of any circumstances (either personal, social or educational) that may have disrupted your studies or caused any disadvantage.

The reference should not be generic or repeat the examination results that you have already achieved. It should, however, reaffirm the information you have provided in your personal statement.

Application and access

Is QMU right for you? All you need to know before applying

QMU is fully committed to widening access to higher education. We recognise that applicants may have received different levels of support, guidance and educational opportunity prior to applying to university. This means that each application received by the University is considered carefully on an individual basis. Admissions decisions are not made on the basis of grades alone.

Q: What do I need to apply for the course I want to study?

A: You'll need qualifications, a personal statement and a reference. For some specific courses you will also need to:

- come to an interview or audition;
- submit a digital portfolio or
- provide evidence of relevant work or voluntary experience.

If English is not your first language you will need to provide evidence of your English language skills through qualifications or a Secure English Language Test.

We call these our entry requirements.

You also need to apply on time:

- UK and EU students: 15 January 2021
- International applicants: 30 June 2021

Applications received after these dates cannot always be considered. Where we receive a large volume of applications, and the number of places on a course is limited, the majority of our decisions will be made after the January UCAS deadline.

Q: What qualifications and grades do I need?

A: The qualifications and grades you need will vary by course and may also depend on whether you are a widening access student.

Q: Am I a widening access student?

A: We aim to identify each applicant's full talent and potential and look beyond grades to do this. We consider you to be a widening access student if you:

- live in a target postcode area which identifies you as living in an area of high deprivation (most deprived 20% in Scotland) as defined by the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation. Visit <http://simd.scot/2016> to see if you live in a target postcode area;
- are eligible and have taken part in the Lothian Equal Access Programme for Schools (LEAPS) or
- are care experienced.

We will also consider you to be a widening access student if you inform us in your application that:

- you have caring responsibilities (unpaid, for a friend or family member who due to illness, disability, a mental health problem or an addiction cannot cope without your support);
- you are estranged from your family or
- you are an armed forces/ ex-military veteran.

Details of additional support for our widening access students can be found on page 24-25.

More about entry requirements

In this prospectus we list entry requirements for each of our courses. This is an example of how the information is presented:

Entry requirements

Scottish Higher:

Standard: BBBC

Minimum: BCCC

Required subjects: English required and Maths preferred at Nat 5/ GCSE level

Unless you are a widening access student you will need to meet the standard Scottish Higher entry requirements in order to gain a place.

If you are a widening access student you will need to meet the minimum Scottish Higher entry requirements in order to gain a place.

Make sure you also check the subject entry requirements which apply to everyone.

For all students, qualifications should normally be achieved by the end of S6 and we accept Highers taken over two or more years.

We accept many different qualifications, including a wide range of international qualifications, but cannot list them all in this prospectus. Please contact our Admissions team



(admissions@qmu.ac.uk) for further information. You can also use the table on the following page to compare qualifications you may already have, or plan to take.

Students presenting SQA Advanced Highers, or strong GCE A Level grades in relevant subjects may be eligible for entry to the second year of some of our courses. Please see individual course pages for further details.

For the purposes of meeting our entry requirements, a pass in a subject will be one of the following:

SQA Higher/ SQA Nat 5: C or above

A Level: D or above

AS Level: C or above

GCSE: C or above/ 4 or above

Irish Leaving Certificate Higher Grades: H3 or above

We will only count the highest level of qualification in any subject. This means that we wouldn't count AS levels or SQA Highers if you have the full A level or an Advanced Higher in the same subject.

Where Nat 5 Mathematics is listed as a subject requirement for entry to a course, Nat 5 Applications of Mathematics or Nat 5 Lifeskills Mathematics will also be accepted at the required grade. This is for all courses except BSc (Hons) Nursing.

Where Higher English is listed as a subject entry requirement, we will also accept Higher ESOL at the required grade, for all courses except BA (Hons) Education Studies (Primary).

Q: Do you accept HNCs and HNDs?

A: Many Higher National Certificates (HNCs) and Higher National Diplomas (HNDs), which are qualifications taken in college, allow you to enter the second or third year of a degree course. Where we cannot offer entry to second or third year of a degree, we will consider your application for first year.

As it is not possible to list all the HNC and HND qualifications we accept, please see our website for further details at www.qmu.ac.uk/college-qualifications

Q: I'm a mature student, can I apply?

We welcome applications from mature students. If you have had a break of a few years in your formal education since school, you may be able to enter university with qualifications such as an Access course or Open University modules.

A foundation or Access course offered by a further education college or other institution could provide you with the experience and qualifications for entry. The Scottish Wider Access Programme (SWAP) offers a range of local Access courses. Details of the SWAP Access courses that are accepted for entry to each course are given on our website at www.qmu.ac.uk/college-qualifications

Before embarking on an Access or foundation programme, you are welcome to contact our Admissions staff for advice on the best way to proceed.

Deferred entry

Applicants holding an unconditional offer for some courses may request to defer entry to the University by one year. If you wish to defer you must contact the Admissions Office, stating the reasons for your request. Requests will be considered on an individual basis.

If it is not possible to grant your deferral request, you will be welcome to submit a fresh application the following year. We only offer the option of a one year deferral, unless the applicant has extenuating circumstances preventing them from beginning their course for two years, such as compulsory national service.

Health

Some courses require specific medical information as a condition of entry and this is detailed in the relevant course entries in the prospectus. QMU is not responsible for any fees or payments incurred by students in obtaining evidence of state of health.

Criminal convictions

Applicants who have been made an offer of a place on a course may be asked to disclose criminal convictions in order to help safeguard the welfare of our students. Applicants for certain courses of study, including allied health and education courses, must declare all criminal convictions at the point of application and in these cases the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974 does not apply.

As a condition of entry, candidates for these courses will be required to provide a satisfactory Enhanced Disclosure from the Criminal Records Bureau, Disclosure Scotland or an appropriate alternative.

Terms and conditions

If you intend to apply for a place at QMU, you must read the following Terms and Conditions and ensure that you understand them. These Terms and Conditions form the basis of the contract you will enter into with QMU should you be offered and accept a place with us.

1. Every effort has been made to ensure that the information contained in this prospectus is accurate at the time of publication (February 2020). The University will use all reasonable endeavours to provide programmes of study listed in the prospectus and to deliver them in accordance with the descriptions of programmes set out. However, as the University is committed to ensuring that programmes remain up to date and relevant, it reserves the right to discontinue, merge or combine programmes and to make variations to the content or method of delivery of programmes, if such action is reasonably considered to be necessary by the University. This, combined with the need to publish the prospectus well in advance, means that changes to the information presented in the prospectus may have occurred. Intending applicants are advised to visit the University website www.qmu.ac.uk/study-here/courses-a-z or contact admissions@qmu.ac.uk before applying. The content curriculum of a course may change for a number of reasons, including that:
 - The change is required to ensure that the course continues to deliver its key learning outcomes and the content of the course is responsive to changes and developments in the areas covered by the course.
 - For courses leading to professional qualifications, accreditation or registration, the changes are required to continue to satisfy pre-requisites of a particular professional or regulatory body responsible for awarding such qualification, accreditation or registration.
 - The change is not a material change to the content or curriculum.
 - The change operates for the benefit of the students on the course.
 - The change is required due to circumstances outside the control of the University; and

- It is necessary to ensure that the programmes continue to align with the University's aims, strategy and mission.

Remedies for students impacted by any such change may include, but are not limited to, provision of alternative course modules or courses, or the option to transfer to another course at the University. It may be desirable or necessary to withdraw certain programmes from the University's portfolio of provision as a result of a number of factors including changes in patterns of demand from prospective students, changes in staffing, a strategic realignment of the University's portfolio or a major organisational change. The University will use its best endeavours to consult meaningfully with students who would be affected by any such change in order to assess any impact on students and mitigate any disruption arising from the change and to identify appropriate alternative arrangements. Arrangements to support the academic interests of existing students impacted by any programme withdrawal will be put in place. In all cases, the University will make every effort to advise students at the earliest possible opportunity of any changes to the course content or curriculum that may impact upon them.

2. In the event of external factors, such as industrial action, the University undertakes to minimise any disruption that may subsequently arise, as far as is practicable.
3. An offer of a place at the University is made on the understanding that, in accepting the offer, the student undertakes to observe and comply with these Terms and Conditions and to abide by, and to submit to the procedures of, the University's Regulations, Policies and Codes of Conduct, as amended from time to time. The University's Regulations, Policies and Codes of Conduct are set out in full within the University's website at www.qmu.ac.uk/about-the-university/quality. Changes to the University's Regulations may be made from time to time for one or more of the following reasons: to reflect changes to the statutory requirements with which the University is required to comply; to reflect best practice regulation across the higher education sector; and more broadly to ensure that the University's Regulations remain fit for purpose as a result of changes or developments within the University. Where the University's regulations are changed and the operation of a new regulation would place a student in a less favourable position than they would otherwise have been under the old regulations, that student may rely on the old regulation as if it continued to apply. Whether a student would be in a less favourable position is a

matter to be determined by the University on a case by case basis depending on the facts and circumstances of a particular student. This would not apply to a situation where the new regulations seek to address a previously unregulated matter. All policies and procedures are subject to regular review and formal approval by the appropriate committee. The University Court has agreed that the University, recognising the need to protect the health of students, staff and visitors to the University, should aspire over time to become a non-smoking campus. The University is currently reviewing its Policies with a view to achieving this aspiration. Students' attention shall be drawn to any amendments to policy in this area.

4. Applicants will have 14 days from receipt of their offer to challenge their fee status. Only exceptionally will changes to fee status be considered after the 14-day period. Applicants who accept an offer by distance communication (for example, via UCAS or online, without face to face contact) have a legal right to cancel the contract at any time within 14 days of the date of acceptance of the offer. Where an applicant wishes to cancel the contract within 14 days of acceptance, he or she must do so by informing the University in writing, unless actioned directly via UCAS Track during the Clearing period. Where an applicant cancels within the 14-day period after acceptance, any advance payment made by that applicant shall be refunded in full. Notwithstanding the aforementioned rights to cancel within the initial 14-day period from acceptance, applicants may withdraw from study at the University, and cancel the contract at any time after registration, by following the University's withdrawal procedure. Where the contract is cancelled in this way, applicants may remain liable for all or part of the tuition fees paid by them or on their behalf, in accordance with University procedures. The University may cancel the contract at any time in accordance with the University's Regulations, Policies and Codes of Conduct.

5. Tuition fees are payable for all courses and are subject to review annually. Tuition fees for new and existing students are liable to increase each year as a result of review. For continuing students, any increase in the level of fee each year will be subject to a maximum percentage equivalent to the higher of the annual increase in the UK Retail Prices Index and 5%. Factors that will determine the need for, and extent of, any increase include any increase set or prescribed by regulatory bodies such as the Scottish Funding Council, Scottish Government, Student Awards Agency for Scotland (SAAS) and the UK Government, and/or increases in the costs of delivering and administering the course. Tuition fees

for the forthcoming academic session are published on the QMU website well in advance of the start of that academic year. Details of tuition fees and other charges can be found on our website at www.qmu.ac.uk/current-students/current-students-general-information/fees-and-charges and on pages 162-163 in this prospectus. All students who are continuing with their studies should review their fee rates prior to starting their next academic session. No student will be deemed to be fully matriculated until his or her tuition fees have been paid in full, or satisfactory evidence is produced that such fees will be paid by a sponsoring authority. No student will be permitted to attend a graduation ceremony or to proceed to the next year of their course until tuition fees for all preceding years have been paid in full. Failure to settle tuition fees by the due date may lead to a student being excluded from attendance at classes. Ensuring tuition fees are paid is the responsibility of the student and, in the event of a student's sponsoring authority refusing or failing to make payment in full or in part, the student will be held personally liable for payment. Students will also be liable for any travel and accommodation costs incurred while on placement. Such costs may be paid by a sponsoring authority but should a sponsoring authority refuse or fail to do so, the student will be personally liable for such costs.

6. For some courses, an additional fee may be payable in respect of registration with a professional body. Additional charges will be made in respect of graduation and, where applicable, reassessment. Full details of registration fees and other charges are set out at www.qmu.ac.uk/current-students/current-students-general-information/fees-and-charges/ and students are also personally liable for such fees.
7. Tuition fees become due on the first day of study and should be paid within 21 days of the due date, or an arrangement made with the Finance Office for payment to be made by instalments. Where a student has opted to pay by instalments, a direct debit mandate must be completed prior to, or at the time of, matriculation. For returning students a new Direct Debit form is required for each year of study. If tuition fees remain unpaid for 21 days after falling due, interest on the full amount at 2.5% above the UK clearing bank base rate may be charged. Where payment is being made by instalments, interest will run on an instalment from the due date to the date when the instalment is paid. Where a student encounters difficulty in paying tuition fees, they are required to contact the Credit Controller at the University Finance Office for assistance in drawing up a payment schedule. Any payment schedule drawn up by the Credit

Controller must be adhered to by the student until the fees in question are paid in full. Where no payment schedule has been arranged with the Credit Controller and tuition fees remain outstanding eight weeks after the end of the 21-day period, or where an instalment is over four weeks late, a student may be asked to leave the University and the debt shall be transferred to a debt collector. If outstanding fees are then paid prior to the end of the academic year, the University may permit a student to be reinstated. However, where the University agrees to such a reinstatement, a student may be required to repeat parts of any course which have been missed, resulting in additional fees being incurred. Students who leave the University more than 28 days after the start of a programme of study will be liable for the appropriate proportion of the fee, based on semesters attended in whole or in part.

8. The University may withdraw or amend its offer or terminate a student's registration at the University if it finds that a false or materially misleading statement has been made in, or significant information has been omitted from, a student's application form.
9. Admission to some degree courses offered by the University, and to some of the professions for which it provides training, may be precluded by certain medical conditions. Students are obliged to include information regarding any medical condition, past or present, which may affect their participation on a course when completing their UCAS or Queen Margaret University application form. If an individual has any doubt as to the effect that a medical or health-related condition may have on their application, they must contact the course Admissions Tutor who will be able to advise accordingly. The University does not warrant or guarantee that a student admitted to a particular course will necessarily be allowed to complete the course if the student subsequently suffers from or contracts any material medical or health condition. Applicants to whom an offer to enter a course has been made may be asked to disclose criminal convictions in order to help safeguard the welfare of our students. Applicants for certain courses of study must declare all criminal convictions at the point of application, and in such circumstances, the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974 does not apply. As a condition of entry, candidates for these courses will be required to provide a satisfactory Enhanced Disclosure from the Criminal Records Bureau, Disclosure Scotland or an appropriate equivalent. If an applicant has any doubt as to the effect a criminal conviction may have on his/her application, they must contact the course

Admissions Tutor who will be able to advise accordingly.

10. To safeguard the welfare of staff, students, visitors and the general public, the University scrutinises all criminal convictions declared by applicants. Continuing students must declare at the point of matriculation any criminal conviction acquired in the previous 12 months. The existence of a criminal conviction itself does not preclude entry to the University, but admission to, or progression within, particular courses, may be precluded by certain types of convictions. Any student who is found to have falsified this self-declaration at the point of application or at matriculation will be subject to disciplinary action.
11. While courses are designed to prepare students for employment, the University does not warrant or guarantee that students will obtain employment as a result of successfully completing any course.
12. The University does not accept responsibility, and expressly excludes all liability, to the full extent permitted by law, for any loss, damage or injury incurred by a student or to their property, whether in connection with their studies or not, except in circumstances where the student has suffered personal injury or death caused by the negligence of the University or its employees. In particular, the University shall not be liable for any loss of, or damage to, any computer or electronic data or information owned or used by a student.
13. Personal information on students will be held and processed according to the Data Protection Act 2018 and the General Data Protection Regulation. This information will be used by the University to fulfil its part of the contract between it and the student. As part of the contract, the University is also required to release certain information on the student population to government agencies. Full details of the way in which the University uses students' information are provided in the Student Privacy Notice which is issued as part of the matriculation process.

Student fees and funding

The types of financial support available to you will vary according to where you live, what you are intending to study, your family circumstances and whether you have previously received funding as a student.

In addition to the financial support highlighted on these pages, many students will also supplement their income via part-time employment during their studies.

While every effort has been made to ensure the accuracy of the information in this section, due to printing deadlines, it is important that you confirm the up-to-date financial support arrangements with your relevant funding body (see next column). The following figures relate to 2019 entry for students from Scotland, England, Wales and Northern Ireland unless otherwise stated. There may be changes to student funding arrangements for 2021 and it is important that you check our website and that of your funding body for additional information. If you have any questions, please contact the Student Funding Adviser.

Students from Scotland

Tuition fees

Students ordinarily resident in Scotland have their tuition fees paid for them. You must apply each year to the SAAS to have your fees paid. Your entitlement to tuition fee and bursary support may be affected if you have already undertaken degree level studies and you should consult with SAAS for further guidance.

Living costs

For all courses (other than Nursing degrees) you will be entitled to living cost support from SAAS in the form of a loan and, depending on household income, also a bursary. For young students (typically those under the age of 25 and not self-supporting) the non-repayable Young Students' Bursary is worth up to £2,000 per year depending on household income.

Students with a household income of less than £21,000 per annum will receive the full bursary and a student loan of £5,750 per year giving a total income of £7,750. Those with a household income of £34,000 per annum or more will not receive a bursary but can apply for a loan of £4,750 per year.

There is no difference between the funding available to a student living at home and those living away from home. You must apply to SAAS each year for living cost support.

There are separate systems of financial support for mature and independent students. Please see the SAAS website.

Students studying Nursing

Any student from Scotland studying on our Nursing degree can apply to SAAS for a non-repayable bursary of £10,000 per annum (a lower rate applies in the shorter final year of the course). These are the new rates for 2020/21. This bursary is non-means-tested, meaning that all students who apply for the bursary will receive the same amount regardless of household income. The University will apply to have your tuition fees paid by the Scottish Health Department once you have started your course. See the SAAS website for any further changes to funding for entry in 2021.

Your entitlement to tuition fee and bursary support may be affected if you have already undertaken degree level studies and you should consult with SAAS for further guidance. Nursing students are not entitled to apply for a Student Loan.

Care experienced students

If you are under 26 at the start of your course and have been in the care of a local authority, your total funding (up to £8,100) will be paid as a bursary. You cannot apply for a student loan for living costs in addition to the bursary.

Non-standard fees

Some of our non-UCAS undergraduate courses may not be eligible for full or even partial SAAS funding. They may also have non-standard tuition fees due to the nature and delivery method of the course. See our website at www.qmu.ac.uk/study-here/fees-and-funding/ for further details.

Students from England, Northern Ireland and Wales

Tuition fees

Students ordinarily resident in England, Northern Ireland and Wales studying on a full-time degree course are liable to pay a tuition fee for each year for their studies. Students can opt to delay payment of these fees by taking out a fee loan, repayable after graduation, from their local funding body.

QMU bursaries

A bursary package is available for students from England, Wales and Northern Ireland, dependent on household income. For further information please see page 165.

Living cost support — England

From 2020 a maximum loan of £9,203 will be available to students living away from home (this figure is subject to parliamentary approval). This is dependent on household income.

Living cost support — Wales

From 2019 a living cost support package of £9,225 will be available. This is made up of a bursary and student loan with the amount of each dependent on household income.

Living cost support — Northern Ireland

From 2019 a maximum loan of £4,840 will be available to students living away from home. Additionally a maximum maintenance grant of £3,475 is available. The levels of loan and bursary are dependent on household income.

International students

If you live outside the EU you are likely to be regarded as an international student and therefore will be asked to pay the international tuition fee rate. Tuition fees will vary according to your course. Further details are available on our website at www.qmu.ac.uk/study-here/fees-and-funding

Students from the European Union

Tuition fees

Previously EU students have had the cost of their tuition fees met by the Scottish Government. At the point of publication there is no information on whether this arrangement will continue for students starting their studies in 2021/22. Updates will be posted on the SAAS and QMU websites as soon as announcement has been made.

Living cost support

Students resident in the EU are not normally able to apply for living cost support from SAAS. You may, however, be entitled to apply for the equivalent living cost support from your own country's funding body and bring this with you for your studies in Scotland. This is often referred to as 'Portability of Student Support'. EU citizens that have been resident in the UK for some time may be entitled to living cost support but the rules are complex and you should enquire with SAAS directly.

Students with a disability

You may be eligible to claim the Disabled Students' Allowance (DSA) to assist with the additional expenses of equipment or individual support that may arise during your studies. This allowance is not income assessed. Applications for DSA must be supported by appropriate evidence and countersigned by a Disability Adviser at QMU.

If you consider that you may be eligible for DSA support, please contact a Disability Adviser at disabilityadvisers@qmu.ac.uk. It is helpful to get in touch as soon as you know that you have a place on your chosen course so that your DSA application process can begin prior to your start date.

Part-time students

If you are a Scottish resident and studying part-time, you may be eligible for assistance with your fees. You should apply through SAAS for a part-time fee grant which will cover much, but not all, of your tuition fees. There is no living cost support available to part-time students.

QMU bursaries



QMU bursaries are available to eligible students from England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

QMU is committed to ensuring that suitably qualified candidates are not deterred from investing in their education on the grounds of ability to pay. For that reason, we will offer the non-repayable bursary package outlined below to all eligible students from the Rest of the UK, outside Scotland.

QMU will use the residual household income figure calculated yearly by the Student Loans Company (SLC) when assessing a student's bursary entitlement during each year of their studies.

It is important when applying for your student loan that you tick the 'consent to share' box so that this can be done.

The Bursary will be a cash award, enabling students to use their bursary as they wish eg contributing to accommodation or living costs or payment towards tuition fees.

It is paid in three instalments over the academic year: 25% in Semester One, 50% early in Semester Two and 25% near the end of Semester Two.




Other useful information

Our campus is situated to the east of Edinburgh, by the coastal town of Musselburgh, with Edinburgh city centre less than six minutes away by train.

How to get to our campus



Our campus is designed to be environmentally sustainable. To minimise car use, much has been done to make it easy for staff and students to use public transport links.

From central Edinburgh by train

The campus is less than six minutes by train from central Edinburgh. QMU is located beside Musselburgh station, while Newcraighall Park and Ride Station is located to the north west of the site, approximately ten minutes away on foot. Musselburgh station is served by trains from Edinburgh and East Lothian, while Newcraighall is served by trains from Edinburgh and the new Borders Railway line. Trains run from Waverley Station to Musselburgh and from both Haymarket and Waverley to Newcraighall. Detailed information can be found on the Scotrail website at www.scotrail.co.uk.

From central Edinburgh by bus

QMU is served by the frequent number 30 Lothian Bus service, which also operates a night bus service. Other services are also in operation at peak times and local providers are regularly adding new options.

Cycling from central Edinburgh

National Cycle Route 1 runs from Edinburgh Waverley Station to the rear of the campus. There are also many quiet roads in the Musselburgh area which allow for safe cycling. These can be seen on the cycle map on our website.

Walking from central Musselburgh

Starting from the High Street, walk south towards the River Esk, continue along this road (it becomes Mall Avenue then Olivebank Road) until the junction of Olivebank Road and Eskview Terrace. Turn left into Eskview Terrace, keep walking until you come to Stoneybank Terrace. Turn right at Stoneybank Terrace, continue on until the road becomes Whitehill Farm Road. Walk down Whitehill Farm Road, passing the Musselburgh train station (on your right), then onto the pedestrian entrance to QMU.

Walking from Fort Kinnaird/ Newcraighall Station

From Fort Kinnaird walk along Newcraighall Road and continue on underneath the Musselburgh bypass and past the Newcraighall Park and Ride (on your right). Just past the Park and Ride, walk underneath the bridge and take the first road on your right; this is the National Cycle Network path. Continue on this path past the Newcraighall Rugby club, which is on your left – until you reach the QMU campus.

From central Edinburgh - by car

From Princes Street, going east, follow signs for A1 to Berwick, along Waterloo Place (continuation of Princes Street), and along Regent Road onto Montrose Terrace. These are just continuations of the same road. At the bottom of Montrose Terrace, it will become London Road, and is still signed for the A1. Continue along London Road until the junction adjacent to New Restalrig Church, where you will turn right onto Willowbrae Road. Continue to follow signs for A1 through Duddingston crossroads and along to the Milton Link intersection, where you turn right onto A1. Go through the roundabout and past the slip road for Newcraighall, and follow signs for Queen Margaret University to the next slip road. From the end of this road turn to the left and the car park entrance is on the right hand side.

From Fife - by car

Take the M90 south towards Edinburgh (signposted Queensferry Crossing Bridge). Continue forward on to the A90 and cross the Queensferry Crossing Bridge. Continue towards South Queensferry. Continue on the A90 into Edinburgh. At the Barnton Junction, turn right onto Maybury Road – A902 (signposted City Bypass). Bear left onto Maybury Road entering Edinburgh. At the roundabout, take the 2nd exit onto Maybury Road – A902. At Maybury Junction turn right onto Glasgow Road – A8 (signposted City Bypass). At Gogar Junction branch left (signposted City Bypass), then at Gogar Roundabout take the 2nd exit onto The City of Edinburgh Bypass – A720 (signposted Berwick upon



Car use at QMU



We operate a needs-based parking policy for staff and students, meaning that those who have a genuine need, such as childcare, will receive a permit in preference to others. You will require a parking permit to park on campus. Permits are priced according to the CO2 emissions of the vehicle. Our car park has several disabled parking spaces located close to the main entrance. Tweed). Travel along the A720 until Sheriffhall Roundabout, take the 3rd exit onto The City of Edinburgh Bypass – A720. Through Old Craighall Junction, at the roundabout take the first exit, then merge onto the A1. Take the exit sign posted Queen Margaret University.

From West Lothian- by car

Take the M9 and at the Newbridge Junction roundabout take the 2nd exit, to continue on the M9. At the junction with the M8, branch left on to the M8. At M8 junction 1, keep in right-hand lane to continue forward (signposted City Bypass South). At Hermiston Junction roundabout take the 3rd exit on to the A720 (sign posted City Bypass South). Continue forward, then merge onto the Edinburgh Bypass – A720. Travel along the A720 until Sheriffhall roundabout, take the 3rd exit on to The City of Edinburgh Bypass – A720. Through Old Craighall Junction, at the roundabout take 1st exit, then merge onto the A1. Take the exit signposted Queen Margaret University.

Our research

By choosing to study at QMU, you'll be part of an academic community that is involved in addressing real-world issues through research and knowledge exchange.

Our research activity will help ensure that your learning takes account of the latest thinking, allowing you to hit the ground running when you enter the workforce or go on to further study. A high proportion of our staff are research active, meaning that our students often learn directly from academics who are involved in research projects with those who are leaders in their fields.

Our research impacts directly on the quality of life: it builds the evidence for change and development in policy and practice. We have a real influence on the bodies that have the power to improve and transform lives, and which are major employers of graduates — government, businesses, healthcare providers, third sector organisations, non-governmental organisations (NGOs) and cultural organisations.

The UK's most recent national audit of research in higher education, the Research Excellence Framework (REF 2014), showed that over 58% of our research is world-leading or internationally excellent. Amongst the highlights was our success in Speech and Language Sciences, in which the proportion of research classed as internationally excellent or world-leading was 92%. At the time the results were published, Times Higher Education singled us out as a 'notable riser' in terms of REF performance.

Some examples of our research and knowledge exchange work:

- Our global health researchers have been looking at how creating child-friendly spaces in countries affected by conflict can keep children safe and how refugees coming to Scotland can integrate better into society. Their work helps shape the policies of government and NGOs on child education and protection, and refugee integration.
- Our nursing staff are involved in research into osteoporosis that is helping to educate front-line healthcare workers in the moving and handling of patients in hospital.
- Our speech and language experts are developing technologies to help improve the speech communication of children with significant speech communication difficulties.
- Our film and media lecturers are continually developing and researching different techniques and styles of filming; they include award-winning filmmakers who have had significant success with showcasing their work on the international film festival circuit. They have been able to share the latest techniques with students and advise them on the process of getting films selected for screening at festivals all over the world.
- We have a strong track record in building relationships with businesses, which helps us develop research which supports business development in the UK. Our work with small businesses has led to several internship opportunities for students. We also work with international partners, including NGOs and academics at universities abroad, to develop collaborative research with global reach.
- We are currently involved in the first research project in Scotland to look at the experiences of lesbian, gay and bisexual (LGB) people who have received treatment for cancer. The aim is to better understand their experiences during their cancer care journey and to establish if services need to be adapted to meet LGB patient care needs.
- A new interactive initiative using virtual reality (VR) with palliative care patients, to transport them virtually to the other side of the world, will look at the impact that it has on their health and wellbeing.
